The Advent Wreath. *One of the most recognizable customs for the season is the Advent wreath. The unbroken circle of greens is an image of everlasting life. Its circular shape, without beginning or end, symbolizes God's unending love for us. The wreath itself is made of various evergreens, signifying continuous life, even during the dormant time of winter. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light, despite the wintry darkness that surrounds us.*

A Service of Lessons and Carols

The festival of "Lessons and Carols" was first held on Christmas Eve 1918 at Kings College in England. The service always begins with the English tune, *Once in Royal David's City*, and includes lessons that span throughout salvation's history. Lessons and Carols at St. John's has been held for over 35 years.


