



**Evening Hymn** 







Reading: Psalm 141

**Psalm 141.** The psalm is sung in canon. Right side = 1; left side = 2)











**Homily**. Our Wednesday homilies during Lenten season reflect on the final days of Jesus' life and ministry, beginning with his entry into Jerusalem and ending with his final words on the cross. Following the homily is a period of silence. The silence is broken by the ancient words of John:

Jesus Christ is the light of the world. A light no darkness can overcome.


We then sing the song of Mary, who offered this "Magnificat" when the angel Gabriel told her that she would bear a son, Jesus, who would deliver the world from the darkness of sin and death. (Luke 1:46-55).

Giving thanks for all who have gone before us and are at rest, rejoicing in the communion of all the saints, we commend ourselves, one another, and our whole life to you,




Let us pray.


