## St. John's to host four services for Christmas Eve

St. John's is hosting four Christmas Eve services this year: 11 am, 2 pm, 5 pm and 8 pm. Because of Covid-19 restrictions, each service will be limited to 100 worshippers, so a reservation system has been set up through our website, or you can contact the church office. The 8 pm service will be live-streamed and available as a recording throughout the week of Christmas.

"We can't have a packed church or a packed choir this year, but there's no doubt we will joyfully give it our all," says Rob Durocher, Minister of Worship and the Arts.

The 5 and 8 pm services will feature brass. The other services will feature a combination of handbells, harp, cello, choir members, soloists, and contemporary worship musicians.

A video explaining the Christmas Eve services will be available in early December.

"Things are different this year, but we're still holding onto those elements that are particularly meaningful, like the singing of carols and the candle lighting ceremony" says Rob. "It's still Christmas Eve and we will still worship the King of Kings."

Pre-service preludes will begin 15 minutes before each service. We're eager to involve as wide a variety of participants as possible, so if you'd like to participate as a reader or in leading prayers, let Rob know.

Of special note is that Pastor Munther Isaac will join us for the online service at 8 pm. He'll be reading the Gospel from Manger Square in Bethlehem, the traditional site of Jesus' birth. Munther is the pastor of Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, a sister congregation of St. John's.

"We are deeply committed to making Christmas Eve a particularly meaningful worship experience," Rob says.

# Pastor's Letter

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Dear friends,

How quickly can we bid farewell to 2020?

# O Come, All Ye Faithful

## A Christmas Carol Reflection

I don't know about you, but there is always something so incredibly triumphant and soul stirring when we all join together to sing the wonderful Christmas carol, *O Come, All Ye Faithful* at the beginning of each Christmas Eve service of worship! As far back as I can remember, and that's a good long time, this has always been a carol that fills my musical senses and seals the deal for me that Christ became like us, fully human and that he became is the 'Word of the Father now in flesh appearing' and that we are extended a wonderful invitation to 'come let us adore him, Christ the Lord!'

We sometimes use the word Christmas *carol* instead of the word Christmas *hymn* because while hymns are traditional poems based on scripture or scriptural thought and have been around for centuries sung by congregations in worship, carols, are seasonal, festive songs. They are usually religious in nature and represent Christmas, Easter and Advent, and have a joyful and festive character to them. *O Come, All Ye Faithful* in a way is actually BOTH a hymn and a Christmas carol!

The text of *O Come, All Ye Faithful* is a little bit of a mystery. There are some that say the text goes as far back as the 13<sup>th</sup> century but when it first appeared in publication, it was called *Adeste Fidelis, laeti triumphates!* The version that we are familiar with today is attributed to the 18<sup>th</sup> century hymnist, John Francis Wade. Wade (1711-1786) was a Catholic layman who left England to live in France following the Jacobean

rebellion of 1745 (when the Catholic, exiled Stuart, 'Bonnie Prince Charlie,' grandson of former King James II who fled England at the glorious Revolution of 1688, tried to gain his ancestral throne of Scotland back from Protestant King George II of England. This was a time when England and Scotland were steadfastly Protestant and Catholics would often escape difficulties by fleeing to Europe for safety.) The text to Wade's carol was written in Latin because Latin was considered the language of academia in the 18<sup>th</sup> century.

*O Come, All Ye Faithful!* was translated into English by in 1841 by Frederick Oakley, a former Anglican priest who converted to Roman Catholicism, and became a canon at Westminster and hymnals. Song books quickly adopted this newly translated Christmas carol. Oakley used four verses of the carol and 19<sup>th</sup> century hymnist William Brooke (1848 – 1917) added more some years later. The carol has evolved over subsequent years with stanzas falling away as other stanzas were added.

The tune *ADESTE FIDELIS* has been attributed to both Francis Wade and even to Frederick Oakley, with the refrain, *O come, let us adore him* being added later. Other possible composers have also been suggested like Thomas Arne, and John Reading. Another school of thought has this carol in a slightly different form attributed to King John IV of Portugal a musician, king, composer, and lover of the arts who might have written the tune. Throwing a little more confusion upon the carol's history is the fact that *Adeste Fidelis* was also called the "Portuguese Hymn" since it was sung with great familiarity regularly in the Chapel of the Portuguese Embassy in London. Whatever its origination the carol has transcended borders and continues to be one of the best loved hymns and Christmas carols throughout the world.

In the first verse of the carol one hears the whisper of Luke 2:15 where the shepherds say "Let us go even unto Bethlehem and see this thing which is come to pass" which places us among the shepherds as they ran with joy to Bethlehem to see the newborn Holy child. We also join the great procession of the faith as they once journeyed in their hearts to Bethlehem!

The original second verse echoes John 1:14 and references

the second article of Nicean Creed establishing a link that reaches back to the church of 325 A.D. to the Council of Nicea where the Creed originates. This verse is also filled with very good theology!

*God of God, Light of Light, lo, he abhors not the  
Virgin's womb.  
Very God Begotten, not created. O come, let us adore  
Him, Christ the Lord!*

In verse three we join with the angel's chorus singing 'Glory to God, glory in the highest' (Luke 2:14),

*Sing choirs of angels, sing in exultation; sing ye bright citizens  
of heaven above.  
"Glory to God, all glory in the highest"!*

The final verse triumphantly joins all those in heaven above and earth below in greeting and adoring our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ at his incarnation as we sing:

*Yea Lord we greet thee, born this happy morning; Jesus to  
thee be glory given!  
WORD of the Father, now in flesh appearing. O come, let us  
adore him, Christ the Lord.*

In these days of pandemic, political dissatisfaction and issues of racial inequity, this simple Christmas carol, *O Come, All Ye Faithful* still speaks to us! Throughout these last nine months we've been encouraged to 'be bold and courageous,' but to also be faithful! Being bold means being faithful. Jesus came into a world that was upside down. He entered 'the midst of humanity that could have shocked his perfect nature.' It wasn't the rich and ennobled who went with haste to Bethlehem to 'see this thing which has come to pass', it was common shepherds and village folk. This was Jesus who would break bread with his friends and disciples, teach and preach from a mountainside, heal the sick, raise the dead, be misunderstood by his family, friends and the government of his day but would show us by his death and glorious resurrection that he was real and dynamic and that the power of his Gospel changes our lives giving us a newness that compels us to share this good news of salvation with others.

We are extended an invitation to 'come and behold him, born the king of angels,' an invitation for us to come to Jesus and find hope, forgiveness and life in him - this little child in a

manger who now reigns supreme as King of kings and Lord of lords who reigns forever and ever. O COME, LET US ADORE HIM, CHRIST THE LORD!

# Youth to receive Chrismons on Dec. 22 at drive-through event

Children and youth at St. John's will celebrate a simple Christmas this year.

Simply Christmas and Chrismons is set for 5:30 to 7:30 pm Tuesday, Dec. 22. Families can enter the campus through the Jackson Street entrance to receive a fun bag, then drive around to the upper level to receive their Chrismons from the Chrismon Ministry Team.

Stacey Shafer, children's minister, is assembling about 100 bags, which will include supplies to make a birthday cake for Jesus.

"'Simply Christmas' is the theme for our Kingdom Kids during December," Stacey says. Thrivent Financial grants have helped Stacey purchase supplies for the event.

In addition to the fun bags and Chrismons, families will receive chocolate milk and cookies along the way. Several staff members will assist with the event as well as the Chrismon ladies, Stacey says. "This will be a fun way for us to give back."

Stacey says she would like to thank Thrivent for the Action Team grants.

She encourages all families with children ages birth to 18 to come to the event. "I really want this to be a success and have as many families come as we can."

Stacey sends out a weekly newsletter to families, and says they may pick up their packages later if they can't be there that evening. "It always works out."

Carol Hair and her Chrismon Team are working to finish 200 Chrismons for the event. Whatever Chrismons are left go to

homebound members the next year. The ladies are meeting on Wednesday afternoons, and have plenty of room to social distance and use their own tools. She and her team are thrilled that the Chrismon tree is going up in the Sanctuary.

For this year, Carol has adapted a pattern from a Rufty ornament, which is under wraps until it is distributed. It's always fun to see how the kids like it each year, she says. "We keep the kids in suspense."

Carol says that making Chrismons has become an addictive hobby. "We probably get more out of our fellowship and the satisfaction of making a Chrismon than the children do in receiving them. It is absolutely a win-win situation."

She makes Chrismons at church and at home, she says. "I try to make two a night. I'm an overachiever!"

# 50 Years of Ordaining Women in the Lutheran Church

As the year 2020 draws to a close, so does the ELCA's 50th anniversary of women in ordained ministry. We want to recognize all the women who have served as pastors at St. John's.



**The Rev. Dr. Marty Stevens** was the first woman to serve as a pastor of the congregation.

As she said then of being a trailblazer, "It was interesting. Some people were not in favor of it, and other people were fine. It takes awhile to change. I get that. Once they got to know me and saw the ministry I had, it was fine." Pastor Stevens returned to St. John's last February as a featured preacher.

**Pastor Mary Peters** became an associate pastor in 1998, the same year that Rob Durocher joined the staff. It was not long after the death of her husband, David.

"Bill Safrit, call committee chair, encouraged me in a way for which I am ever grateful," Mary says. "He said, 'Please consider this call; we will help you,'."

"Love came again and marriage to Donald Miller took me away to Virginia in May of 2000. We were married at St. John's on one exceedingly hot day in May. After a short time in Virginia, Bishop Bolick phoned and I was called to serve on the his staff from 2001 to 2003.

"After a move to Atlanta, Pastor Robert Sims (of the Sims family at St. John's) phoned and I was subsequently called to serve at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Atlanta in 2005 as their Pastor for Member Care. I served as dean of my conference of the Southeastern Synod during that time. I retired from Redeemer in November of 2019. My husband and I moved to Spartanburg, SC, for retirement, but Bishop Smith phoned and Donald and I are now interim pastors at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Kings Mountain.



"All the significant people in my ministry career have been connected with St. John's, and I credit this congregation for

loving me back to health. I find myself wanting to say thank you to lots of people, like Pastor Carl Sachtleben. I have a debt of gratitude to folks at St John's."

After serving as a pastor at St. John's from 2000 to 2009, **Pastor Jennifer Ginn** now serves Cross and Crown Lutheran Church in Matthews.

Pastor Ginn was instrumental in helping to form the contemporary service and enjoyed a unique ministry in story-telling. She helped train a team of story-tellers who presented the gospel stories in worship.

**Pastor Jan Huntley** was to preach at St. John's in November, but that opportunity has been delayed because of the virus. After serving at St. John's from 2010 to 2013, Pastor Jan now lives in Durham with her husband, the Rev. Dr. Harvey Huntley.



"It was one of the most joyful times in ministry I have ever experienced," Pastor Jan says.

**Pastor Danielle DeNise** now serves as the synod's Director for Evangelical Mission, based at the N.C. Synod Headquarters. She and Pastor Laura Henrik recorded a podcast together earlier this year about the joys and challenges of being a female pastor.

Pastor DeNise began work at St. John's as a youth director, until discernment led her to complete work towards ordained ministry. She was ordained at St. John's in 2015, leaving 9 months later to accept the synod's call. Along the way she married Michael. They are the parents of Moses and Olive.

In January of 2018, **Pastor Laura Henrik** and her family moved from the upper Midwest to Salisbury to begin a new call at St. John's as the Pastor for Discipleship. Pastor Henrik grew up in Knoxville and attended seminary in Columbia, but her first two calls were in Minnesota and North Dakota.

"I tossed out the snow shovel whenever we moved."

Currently she manages the congregation's youth program and oversees staff in children's and adult discipleship ministry. She and her husband, Davin, are the parents of Eliana and Everett.

**Pastor Beth Kearney** was a longtime member of St. John's while serving as an assistant to the bishop. She retired in 2017 after 36 years in ordained ministry.

"I was sort of at the beginning of the second wave of women," Beth says. "I was the third ordained woman in North Carolina, and then Doug and I were the first clergy couple in North Carolina."

Early in her ministry, Beth and Doug were in a restaurant with high booths. The men in the booth next to her were talking about their congregation. One was complaining that his pastor never visited, and another complained that his pastor always asked for money. The third man, whose voice they recognized, then said, "Y'all think y'all got problems? My pastor is pregnant!"

Two daughters of the congregation are serving in ordained ministry. **Pastor Adrienne Martin** is pastor of Sardis, Hickory, while **Julie Tonnesen** will begin a call as associate pastor of Macedonia, Burlington, on Jan. 1. Adrienne's mom, Debbie Martin Purpur, is a certified lay preacher through the N.C. Synod.



"In honor of their ministries at St. John's and the Lutheran church, each of these pastors was invited to preach during 2020," says Pastor Rhodes. "Unfortunately, Covid-19 changed most of those plans. Nevertheless we give thanks for their ministry, their deep sense of call, and their continued commitment to the work of the church. No doubt we are better people and congregations because of their presence. Thank you!"

# A budget to support our ministry

The St. John's Congregation Council recognizes our role to be good stewards of God's resources and to invite people into a relationship with the vision and mission of this church. As staff and Council developed the 2021 Budget, fully aware of these uncertain times, three priorities were kept in mind:

1. To present a balanced budget that relies on revenue projections based on the 2021 Consecration Sunday response.
2. To use conservative income revenue projections.
3. To begin the year with a three-month budget reserve.

With that in mind, the Council offers the following Proposed 2021 Budget, which represents a .4 percent decrease from 2020 income and a .2 percent decrease in expenditures.

As part of the St. John’s covenant relationship with Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, Rev. Dr. Munther Isaac will be leading a discussion of his most recent book, *The Other Side of the Wall: A Palestinian Christian Narrative of Lament and Hope*.

"This book is my invitation to you," Pastor Munther writes, "to step into the other side of the wall and listen to our

stories and perspective. It is my humble request to you to allow me to share how Palestinians experience God, read the Bible, and have been touched and liberated by Jesus—a fellow Bethlehemite who has challenged us to see others as neighbors and love them as ourselves. . . This book paints a picture of our story of faith, lament, and hope. And I invite you to join and listen, on our side of the wall."



## Supporting Student Growth - Even in a Pandemic *St. John's Local and Global School Partnerships*

Most people's lives and routines have changed since the onset of the pandemic. Whether here in the United States, or in far-away places, many have suffered loss of social interaction, security, and health. Many have also found ways to cope and continue living life in spite of challenges inherent in a world that requires the uncomfortable reality of social distancing.

Possibly, nowhere have the challenges been felt more than by our learners and students here and overseas. Schools scramble to discover how to balance important health and safety measures while continuing to ensure that students are nurtured academically, physically, and emotionally. Two of St. John's partner organizations are experiencing such challenges and developing innovative ways to meet them.

### Isenberg Elementary School

St. John's has been in partnership with Isenberg Elementary School since 2015 with the creation of the "Gator Reading Club." (St. John's Strategic Plan includes a commitment to "help break the cycle of poverty in Rowan County.") This reading program focuses on third grade students who tested just below grade level in reading and pairs them with St. John's volunteers twice weekly for 45 minutes each session. As over 90% of Isenberg's students are living in poverty, based on federal guidelines, these tutoring sessions provide a crucial intervention that has consistently enabled students to make growth on their state reading tests. When schools were closed by North Carolina's stay-at-home order in March, volunteers were no longer able to enter the school building to work with Isenberg's students. Students received online remote instruction from their regular teachers during this time up until the end of the school year. Fortunately, St. John's is continuing its presence at Isenberg. The St. John's Endowment fund provided funding for over 150 new library books for Isenberg's Media Center and late last spring, several church members provided furnishings for an Isenberg family that was moving from a shelter to a permanent home. Once schools can safely return to normal, the Gator Reading Club will resume.

On a hybrid live instruction/virtual instruction schedule, Isenberg's learners rotate attending school physically two days a week and virtually three days. In order to maintain

academic growth, students receive and submit instruction via learning management systems called SeeSaw and Canvas. Students who need a helping hand in reading and math receive targeted interventions 2 to 3 times a week. Staff members maintain virtual “office hours” where students can call in via Zoom to check in with their teachers regarding coursework or with the school Guidance Counselor for social and emotional learning needs.

In order to provide students with enrichment experiences, Isenberg continues its emphasis on global competencies and team-building endeavors. As part of its global focus, Isenberg is in its second year of a Dual Language Immersion program. Other extracurricular experiences continue to be provided such as Student Government Association, K-Kids (Kiwani's Kids), spirit week, virtual parties, and cultivation of a school garden through a partnership with Happy Roots.

Isenberg’s PTA continues to actively take steps to enrich the school environment. Currently, the PTA is raising funds to purchase an Isenberg sweatshirt for each of its 305 students. Sweatshirts are \$30 each, with part of the proceeds going to the PTA for parent and student engagement activities.

## South Sudan

As part of St. John’s global ministries for over 10 years, Sudan Rowan has, with the help of St. John’s Endowment fund, been instrumental in establishing the Gumriak and Nyarweng Primary Schools as the #1 and #4 performing primary schools in Ruweng State, a region of South Sudan where historically 90% of adults cannot read. Although schools are closed and not expected to open before early to mid 2021, the South Sudanese government permits primary school teachers to initiate targeted education support during COVID-19 so that educational gains are not lost to the pandemic.

In September, Sudan Rowan received Endowment funds to

provide partial support so that teachers can provide specialized small group tutoring for Grades 7-8 (the two years that lead to all-important national exams and secondary school placements) and receive professional development to improve lesson plans in anticipation of the 2021 academic year. Also, 15 graduates (5 girls and 10 boys) of Gumriak and Nyarweng Primary Schools are the only students from Ruweng State who attend private secondary schools (high schools) - a huge honor! Due to school closures, they need tutoring to maintain academic progress, including virtual access to curricular content via radios, solar-charged tablets/laptops with English as a Second Language content (ESL), a desktop computer, and printer for written exercises.

In addition, Sudan Rowan plans to resume providing support to Angela Nyangok Ngor, a South Sudanese college student who is studying in Uganda. One of Angela’s educational goals is to return to her tribal family and help provide opportunities for literacy and to encourage girls to receive an education.
