In January, Corinne Mauldin took over as chair of the Worship and the Arts Ministry Group from longtime chair Gretchen Witt. Those are big shoes to fill, Corinne notes, and she appreciates Gretchen's continuing guidance.

"As we return to worship, we'd like to welcome people into the joy of pulling it all together," Corinne says. "There are so many different ways to become involved." That includes everything from being a lector, a communion assistant, or serving on

Danny Hines: Total Power (a Vince Flynn novel in the Mitch Rapp series) by Kyle Mills. On the more serious side he's tackling Uncomfortable Conversations with a Black Man, by Emmanuel Acho, a former NFL linebacker and current Fox Sports analyst.

Taylor Hutchins will tackle *Love is the Way*, by Episcopal Bishop Michael Curry.

Jon Koppe is looking forward to Can't Hurt Me, by David Goggins, which tells the story of the author's enormous struggles during childhood and his hard work and perseverance to become a Navy Seal and Army Ranger.

Rob Durocher takes the deep dive, tackling a couple of heady books, including Maverick: A Biography of Thomas Sowell, by Jason Riley. Sowell is a conservative social theorist considered one of the great thinkers of his era. He's also looking at Monsieur de Saint George: Virtuoso, Swordsman, *Revolutionary (the "Black Mozart"),* by Alain Guede.

Diane Poole hasn't decided yet, but here's what she says: "I just finished Priscilla, by Dr. M.J. Simms-Maddox, retired professor of Political Science at Livingstone College. She's written 4 or 5 other books, which I intend to read next. It's about a young black woman, daughter of a pastor, and her life in the game of politics. Very interesting. She writes in what I call 'old style,' i.e. descriptive enough to tweak your imagination into overdrive instead of the short, sweet, staccato writing of today."

Angel Owens is our reader extraordinaire. She's got several on her list, including *The Rhythm of Prayer*, edited by Sarah Bessey, Man Enough by Justin Baldoni, and The Ballad of Songbirds and Snakes by Suzanne Collins

And Stacey Shafer is where most folks are in mid-May – she just can't make up her mind yet. She writes, "if anyone has a book about how to let your child go to college, that may be a good subject for me!" If you have a suggestion, just let Stacey know.

Maybe that'll help in your search for the perfect summer read. Whatever you choose, let us know ... and enjoy! After a year like we've had, it'll be so nice to sit back, read a good book, and say "life is good today."

Worship + Technology @ St. John's

Every time you pull up the livestream broadcast for the St. John's 11 am service, or listen to a podcast, or watch a Faith*Life* video, you can thank the St. John's Technology Ministry Team.

"Through this whole pandemic, we've been able to create more ministry opportunities," says Taylor Hutchins, who leads the team, and who went fulltime with St. John's during COVID. "We've added volunteers to work graphics, camera, sound and lights for our 11 am service."

Although the 11 am service represents the flagship efforts of the team, Taylor also leads the volunteers who provide sound, media and lighting for the 9:27 service.

"That need will grow when we get camera equipment in that space," he notes.

There are basically two approaches to cameras, Taylor explains — manned cameras, and robotic cameras, such as the ones in place in the sanctuary. The Faith Center originally had cameras in its plans when it was completed in 2015, but the cost of \$55,000 was eventually cut.

"Those can be replaced with robotic cameras," Taylor says, "and that technology has developed over time. The robotic camera doesn't take up as much space, and it's much less invasive in the worship spaces."

Taylor notes that the cameras in place in the sanctuary have to be good in low-light situations depending on what type of service is taking place.

St. John's started streaming its 11 am service in November 2018, and purchased new cameras during Holy Week 2019. In March 2020, the Technology Ministry Team started producing pre-recorded services during the pandemic. The services were filmed in the sanctuary because the cameras were already set up.

Videos can be shot with different levels of quality, and Taylor says he always shoots higher quality than he needs to. Congregation members look forward to each upcoming Sunday service's "trailer" (or preview), shot by either Pastor Rhodes or Pastor Laura via iPhone.

"We've learned things along the way," Taylor admits. "We've definitely had to tweak as we go. We were ahead of the curve going into the pandemic, but we had to find out what worked best for us."

You can access videos of previous services on the St. John's website or its YouTube channel. WSAT, the local radio station, still broadcasts the previous week's service each Sunday at 10 am. You can also watch the previous Sunday sermon each Monday in the Faith*Life* email. Taylor also produces the monthly "Conversations that Matter" podcast with Pastor Rhodes.

"The beauty of online is that people aren't tied down to a certain time," Taylor points out. "They can watch anytime. It's not anything like being here, but it's as close as we can get."

Taylor hopes to add more cameras in the main sanctuary as well as cameras in the fellowship hall to capture teleconferencing capabilities — all the while keeping prices down for the G2G phase 2 project.

"It's something we can all benefit from, and I'm really excited about that," Taylor says of the upgrades.

Away from St. John's, Taylor owns his own company, DKM Media, which provides web design, video productions, drone work, and virtual tours for churches and other non-profit organization.

Of Note: On May 22, 2021, Taylor married Pamela Lopez-Arrendondo of Hickory. Fittingly, they met on e-Harmony.

"It's called a service because we are serving God. It's fun to see people's faces and the children who come up to take communion. It's great to be part of our congregation and part of the family of God. Communion is an especially big deal to be a part of. It's the thing I missed most about not being in worship. It's who we are."

As a retired school teacher, Kathy Norris has never minded being in front of groups of people, although she admits serving as a lector in front of a congregation of mostly adults is different.

But, she says, "I get as much or more from these lessons as the congregation does. You feel a connection. I try to look at the people and engage them."

She notes that it does take time to prepare to read the lessons. "I read through them enough times that I feel familiar with the passages," she says. "I want to feel comfortable. You have to decide where you want to accent and put emphasis."

Kathy often reads before and after the selected text to get an idea of the context of the particular scriptures of the day.

"It interests me that people will take the time to stop and say something to me afterward," she says. "It's something that's meaningful for people."



When practicing for the recent Pentecost service, Kathy had the opportunity to sit in the pew and hear Brenda Munday read.

"It was such a blessing to me to sit there and listen to her," she says. "We have so many good readers. When someone does a good job and tries to connect with people, it does mean so much more to me as the listener, and I'm sure to others. I hope that God will help me and use me — and all of us — so that we can be a blessing to others when we are reading."

That includes directing visitors to the elevator and restrooms, he says. "When you're in a strange place, you are totally lost."

It's not a huge commitment, Bill says. St. John's hosts anywhere from 20 to 25 funerals a year. It takes about an hour and a half for each funeral. Ushers distribute bulletins and direct visitors, then turn off the lights and lock the doors after each service has ended. "It's not anything difficult," he says. "It's just about being there."

Dear Sisters and brothers in Christ,

Greetings to you from Jerusalem in the name of our Lord and savior Jesus Christ. As you are following the news of what is happening in Jerusalem and the unprecedented escalation of violence our country is experiencing, we would like you to pray for us, to those who have died and those who have lost their homes and beloved ones. As we listen to the sound of the warplanes, and watch the news, our hearts get full of sorrow and fear. Where should we go? To whom should we resort? And when this war is going to end?
