Welcome Ricky Howsare, Contemporary Worship Leader

St. John's has welcomed Ricky Howsare as its new contemporary worship leader. He started work on July 6 and his first Sunday in worship was July 11.

Ricky and his wife, Kimberly, are in the process of moving to Salisbury from Pennsylvania.

Kimberly, a childcare provider, is taking care of selling their house, as well as taking care of their animals: two dogs, three cats, two love birds, and a peacock. Ricky has already brought his small fish tank with him.

At 14, Ricky discovered his gift for singing.

"I established my relationship with Christ at a young age," he says. "I was born and raised in a Christian household, and I grew up in a non-denominational church."

By the time he got to college, he had been singing in his community. He received a bachelor's degree in music with an emphasis in voice from the University of Louisville. Upon graduation, he said, he had no plans for ministry.

"I always had a way with an audience," he says. "I could have bet money that's where my life was headed."

For two years, he worked at the American Music Theater an 1,800-seat venue in Lancaster, Pa. It's the secular version, he says, of the larger Sight and Sound Theater in that town. He was a full-time singer-performer. At Christmas, the singers and dancers did 14 shows a week.

"That will wear you out," he notes.



He was struggling, he says. Finally, he shut the door to his room one day and began to pray. And he had a clear voice from God calling him into ministry.

"I never had any inkling that was where my life was headed," he says, "but I had a peace and assurance about everything. I knew God would provide."

A week later, he had a call from a pastor in his hometown who was looking for a full-time worship leader.

"It was a lot of risk for both parties," he said, "but I worked there full-time for 2 1/2 years."

He notes, "Ministry is something new

and fresh for me, but it is my passion. I have never looked back. A transformation has taken place in me, the same as in anyone's testimony. How can I use music to bring someone else to an experience of worship? How can I give God space to minister?"

He adds, "I give the glory to God. God did this in me and through me. We need to ask the question, how can church bring you as a worshipper into a place where you can have an experience with God that meets your needs?"

Although he will primarily lead the 9:27 service, Ricky has an appreciation for all types of music and all facets of worship.

"The level of collaboration with the music staff is a really awesome thing to be a part of. Ultimately, we are part of the same church."

Away from work, Ricky and Kimberly enjoy being outdoors in nature. They're eager to hit the local trails.

When I was in seminary, I could have never guessed

God would lead me to Minnesota and North Dakota, but I am so glad God eventually led me to St. John's. I think back on all the memories that I will take with me: Women's Bible Study, time at the CDC, youth trips, weddings and funerals, chapel at the Kindergarten, Youth Sundays, baptisms and confirmation, weekend retreats, Holy Week and the beautiful exhaustion, Women's Christmas party, VBS, the youth championship basketball games, First Communion, lunch/coffee/ice cream meetings, youth groups, Hands and Feet camp, Lutheridge and the congregational retreat, Christmas Eve services, staff retreats and fun days, and the list could go on and on. I really cannot say how much you have meant to my family and me.

After my mom died, I got a book for Eliana and Everett called "The Invisible String" by Patrice Karst. Two little kids get scared one night during a thunderstorm. They run out to their mother, who tells them about the invisible string that we carry within our hearts that connects us to each other. When you share a special connection with someone, a string is created. This string can go anywhere, deep in the ocean or far away in outer space... even to heaven. We now talk about invisible strings a lot in our family. When we feel scared,

alone, or when we are missing someone too much, we are reminded of our invisible string. Where are with the renovations?

We're still on track to move with our schedule. It's been a great project so far, but not surprisingly we've run into a few snags. They've found ways to mitigate all the challenges we've had so far. We continue to do demolition and abatement, and we've started building walls for the small dining room and equipment rooms.

What's the big project this month?

This month, we'll have to dig a trench from the education building to the sanctuary building for a new electrical circuit. That means power across campus (except the Faith Center) will be shut down for approximately two weeks. The new circuit is necessary so that we can add additional electrical capacity, which is necessary as we address old infrastructure.

Why is the organ not working?

It's definitely working, but the project required us to relocate the organ blower, which is how the organ breathes. It should be up and running by early August.

What causes the plaster problems in the sanctuary building?

Plaster blossoms when moisture gets into the wall. Eventually the plaster will break and fall. It's not a surprise, especially with old buildings. We're taking care of it through this project, which includes areas in the sanctuary, the stairwells, and the top floor storage areas. It will look better than new when finished!

When do you expect to be finished?

We anticipate that the project will take 13 months from when we began on June 1. The contractors are doing a great job and we have every reason to think that we'll stay close to schedule.

Paula Levianu is Named St. John's CDC Director Welcome, Paula!

On June 14, St. John's Child Development Center welcomed a new executive director.

"Everything is going well," says Paula Levianu. "I'm focusing on staff and maintaining what's going well. They are very tired from the pandemic. They have worked so hard. I want to focus on being a team and stabilize the staff we have."

Paula is in the process of hiring more staff, and there is a waiting list for the CDC.

Paula moved to Salisbury from Pennsylvania and has just gotten settled into her new apartment. She applied for the job through Indeed.com, and had phone and video interviews before her in-person interview. Paula's sister and her family live in Graham, and that plus the lure of warmer weather was an irresistible combination.

"Every time I would come to visit," she says, "I thought, why am I not living down there?"

Paula says that the staff and church have been very welcoming. "I'm impressed with the heart that's behind the staff. They're here for the children and families, and that's the right reason."

Paula has 30 years' experience in early childhood care and education. Ironically, she says, she's worked at a St. John's before. She taught fifth through eighth grades at St. John the Baptist Catholic School. She's worked in quality control for childcare centers. She's also worked with the Pennsylvania quality rating system for childcare centers. It is similar to North Carolina's in that it uses the star rating system. She's worked in childcare centers, been the designator for the rating system, and has supervised designators.

"I feel really comfortable with what's expected at a 5-star quality level," Paula says. "If we have a sound foundation and do what we are supposed to do day to day, we'll be able to quickly maintain a high quality of care. If the processes and policies are in place to be sure the quality is there, it runs on

its own. You just have to make sure it continues. Staff is already on a roll with what needs to happen. I just want to fine tune at this point."

Paula says she is impressed with how the staff, church and families are willing to work together. "I am absolutely thankful for that."

The late Dr. Shirley Ritchie founded the CDC. Her vision of what it should and could be continues today, Paula says.

"The staff continues to make a difference. The love of early childhood care makes a huge difference."

Paula was a senior in high school when her school ran a preschool three days a week. As a freshman in college, she thought she wanted to be an interior designer, but one class changed her mind.

"I did a lot of soul searching and decided to look into it," Paula says of her chosen field.

She's currently at work on a master's degree in Early Childhood Studies: Administration, Management, and Leadership.

"Challenges are important to me," Paula explains. "They keep me motivated and keep me going. I'm driven by challenges. If I'm the director of a childcare center, I want the degree to back it up."

Paula has a daughter, 24, who works at an animal shelter in Pennsylvania.

Away from work, Paula enjoys being in nature, especially kayaking with her miniature dachshund Lucy, 12.

"She's still pretty spry," Paula notes.

"From the beginning, our hearts longed to help others. We didn't know our path, we didn't know our calling, but we knew we wanted to be used. A simple prayer of "use me, use us" guided our day-to-day actions. In 2008, we heard of the brutal abuse of women and children in the Democratic Republic (DR) of the Congo; our hearts broke. Our finances limited our ability to help, but we gave what we could and we gave from our heart. We had found our purpose.

"Fast forward to 2015 and our paths crossed with <u>Exile</u> <u>International</u>. Their work and their mission aligned with our mission. We knew many spoken and unspoken prayers led us to Exile International and a partnership began. By partnering

with Exile International, we bring awareness to this extraordinary organization and we further our purpose of helping the women and children of the DR of the Congo. This very purpose guides us every day."

Volunteer with Barnabas Connection!

After a year's hiatus due to COVID-19, we are gearing up for another year of Barnabas. The Barnabas Connection is an after-school arts program at St. John's for at risk students at Knox Middle School. Through arts programming and positive adult interaction we provide a safe place for students who are facing challenges in their lives to express themselves and to find supportive adult companionship.

The students who participate are chosen by the counselors at Knox for a variety of reasons. Some have recently lost family members and need a comforting place to be and adults to talk to who are not dealing with their own grief. Some are experiencing homelessness and are living in crowded places where they have no quiet or space of their own, and no adults not stressed out by the circumstances with whom to talk. Some live in households where there are abusive relationships and need time away from the trauma and supportive adults to talk to. There is a wide variety of other reasons that the students we work with need just a little extra support.

We meet at St. Johns, Wednesdays from about 2:45 to 5 pm, throughout most of the school year. We share a meal, share "circle" time where we talk about issues and problems facing these young people and look at skills to cope with these problems. Then we sit down together and make art; and while we work we talk and try to provide guidance, and solace, and help to these young people.



Come make a difference in a young person's life. Be a part of Barnabas. We need volunteers of two kinds. Individuals that can come regularly, weekly if possible, to provide adult support and companionship for these children. And individuals (or groups) who want to share an art project with these young people.

Who was Barnabas?

Barnabas was one of the prominent Christian disciples in Jerusalem. According to Acts 4:36, he was a Cypriot Jew. Named an apostle in Acts 14:14, he and Paul undertook missionary journeys together, with a particular heart for those who didn't know the gospel. His name means "son of encouragement" and, thus, serves as the perfect role model for our Barnabas Connection ministry.

Barnabas' story appears in the Acts of the Apostles, and Paul mentions him in some of his letters. Of particular importance is that Barnabas "opened the door" for Paul to join the apostles (Acts. 9:27) — a gesture of great hospitality and love, and the reason we chose this verse in naming the 9:27 service. Acts 11:24 describes Barnabas as "a good man, and full of the Holy Spirit and of faith."

Although the date, place, and circumstances of his death are historically unverifiable, Christian tradition holds that Barnabas was martyred at Salamis, Cyprus. He is traditionally identified as the founder of the Cypriot Orthodox Church.

The marker will be located one block north of St. John's, between the curb and sidewalk along North Church Street, adjacent to the Oak Grove Freedman's Cemetery.

Other events that weekend include *Historic Marker Dedication & Service of Remembrance* at Soldiers Memorial AME Zion at 7 pm on Friday, Aug. 6 and *Equal Justice Initiative Speaks!* at St. Luke's Episcopal Church at 10 am on Saturday, Aug. 7, ending just prior to the St. John's event.

The historical marker and series of events is the product of a partnership between the local grassroots organization Actions in Faith and Justice and the Alabama-based Equal Justice

Initiative which has placed similar markers in several states. The Salisbury marker will be the first installed in NC.

The Conversations that Matter team is led by Geoffrey Hoy and meets regularly to plan events and activities that address today's complex societal environment. The Conversations that Matter team echoes the sentiments of the church's Vision for Racial Healing whereby our congregation pledges to oppose racism in all its forms, work for the healing and health of our community, and build relationships of trust and solidarity with people in and beyond our congregation so that we may grow together into the people God desires us to be.

Providing tablets and cell phone data for students in Guatemala

"COVID-19 has not been good to Guatemalans."

In Guatemala, the already-challenging economic situation became much worse with the onset of the pandemic in March 2020. Quite simply, COVID-19 has not been good to Guatemalans. Because of the pandemic, children have been attending school from home for almost **two years**, since the academic year in Guatemala begins in January and ends in October. Since less than 4 percent of Guatemalans are vaccinated, our students will continue learning from home for the rest of this year, and likely for next year as well.

But how do you teach and learn remotely when the vast majority of our families do not have access to a device or WIFI? To support the children's continued learning, we are raising money during the months of July and August to purchase tablets and cell phone data packages for the kids to use during at-home learning. A tablet costs **\$105** and cell phone data costs about **\$26** per month. With these two items alone—an educational tablet and cell phone data—the kids are able to participate in live lessons with their teachers and complete assignments.



A benefactor has agreed to match all donations up to \$3000. If you donate \$105, one tablet automatically becomes TWO tablets, and if you donate \$26, one month of cell phone data becomes TWO months! To learn more or to support this effort, please visit <u>http://wearegraces.org/tablets</u>.
