Shower The Dwelling with Love Advent Service Project Helps Provide Showers to the Homeless

From their mission statement: "The Dwelling proclaims boldly that there is holiness in the identity as someone experiencing homelessness, that they share a kinship with God who reminds us all that we are all wanderers in search of belonging."

St. John's is developing a new relationship with The Dwelling in Winston-Salem. The Dwelling is a church for those experiencing homelessness. Its founding partners are the North Carolina Synod, Moravian Church Southern Province, City with Dwellings, and Augsburg Lutheran Church.

Pastor and founder of The Dwelling is the Rev. Emily Norris, daughter-inlaw of Kathy and Darrell Norris.

This Advent season, St. John's women's ministry (GIFT) and Kingdom Kids are sponsoring a service project to benefit one of the primary ministries of The Dwelling, the mobile shower unit.

Kristin May learned about The Dwelling and invited the GIFT team to consider forming the partnership.

"We were talking about our Christmas party," she says, "and

we decided we wanted to do something for the community this year. The Dwelling just made sense. Within the last year, Pastor Emily had preached here at St. John's, her husband grew up here, and the ministry was expanding. It just made sense to partner."

In addition to the service project, GIFT's Christmas party is titled "Shower The Dwelling with Love," where they'll assemble shower kits.

Our youth group is also getting involved. Caroline Parrott, interim youth director, took the youth to The Dwelling on Nov. 14 for a RAK (Random Acts of Kindness) Attack to serve a meal.

"I was planning our November RAK Attack and I knew I wanted to do something there," Caroline says.

"We left St. John's on Sunday morning at 10 am, joined them for worship, and then shared a meal with them afterwards."

She continues, "It really was a unique experience. It was come as you are. There was no music, and no churchy words. But still, I got a lot out of it. It stripped down the service to bare bones. I worshipped with people who didn't look like me and that was really cool."

"I definitely feel called to give in that way," she says. "I left there feeling like I wanted to come again. Doing something like this seems like a good way to get started."

Members are invited to bring shower kits that will be distributed to everyone using the mobile shower unit. Details are at the end of this article.

The Dwelling's website has this to say about the shower ministry: "Recognizing the baptismal connections of access to a shower, a basic human luxury, The Dwelling stewards a mobile shower ministry where persons experiencing homelessness are able to be washed and renewed as a reminder of their belovedness. There is healing and dignity that comes with the gift of water, and The Dwelling, with the help of local partners and volunteers, will be stewards of that gift. "



Pastor's Letter



Dear friends,

As inflation concerns grow in the US, anxious economists are beginning to talk about its impact on the upcoming Christmas season. We're a consumer society, after all, and a big driver of our economy is how much you consume/spend/buy this time of year. More

spending = larger profits = stronger economy. It's pretty simple.

But the Gospel adds an important twist — that our *primary* role as a Christian isn't to be a consumer, but a contributor. We don't watch on the sidelines; we engage. We give. We encourage each other. We make sacrifices for the sake of our neighbor. We do life together.

I'm not suggesting that you shouldn't buy Christmas gifts this year! My mom taught me the joy of giving early on, so I know there's great ministry that can be tied to the way we share gifts with each other.

What we should remember, however, is that the health of our *personal* economies (our lives and relationships) isn't rooted in being a consumer, but a contributor.

What might that look like as we step into a new year? What goals come to mind as you imagine a post-Covid world?

For many of you, worshipping at home has been an enormous blessing during Covid. We're so glad to have been able to produce a service that takes seriously our live *and* online community. That will continue, no doubt, especially as our online presence grows.

Having said that — and I'm simply repeating what you've told me — it's hard to serve from the sofa. It's hard to experience community from your living room. It's hard to experience the full power of a worship gathering through the lens of a digital device.

With that in mind, I'd like to offer a challenge — or let's call it an opportunity! For those who are ready to re-engage with in -person worship, use the 4 weeks of January as a starting point. Commit to worshipping *each week*. Not just once, but each week of January. For many, it's a matter of returning to a discipline that was important to you pre-Covid. For those who are ready to establish a new routine altogether, it's a great way to get started.

4 Sundays in January. It's a great way to begin the new year, don't you think?

Blessings to you this Christmas season. It's such a special time of year ... and you are such a special child of God. I'm so thankful to be working in the Garden with you.

Advent: A new church year begins

When Advent begins on November 28 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the fourweek Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12-day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter makes the pinnacle of each church year. Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again. "Like a great waterwheel,"

write Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."

The group received Thrivent grants for shower supplies and meal preparation. As Pastor Emily reminded the students, "sharing a meal is serving."

B.J. Connor and her husband, Mike, also attended the service with St. John's youth.

"We worshipped and ate with 'misfits on the margins," B.J. says. "We were alongside people who are homeless, some who were struggling with addictions, and others who were recently out of prison."

"During confession, people can shout out how they're feeling like 'afraid' or 'angry.' People are free to wander in and out. The message is always that Jesus' love is bigger than the worst thing you've ever done. There's a real feeling of community, acceptance, welcome, inclusiveness, mutual support."

B.J. recounts making a new friend, Rosalyn, who gave thanks for being "clean" 65 days. "She keeps track of the number of days on her phone. She likes to do artwork during the sermon, making comments like 'Mm hmmm' and 'That's right!' as she colored away. She used her cigarette lighter to light the candle on our table and other nearby tables. "

B.J. and Rosalyn have continued their friendship, staying in touch through text message.

B.J. continues, "It was a very meaningful service for us. There's a real feeling of community, acceptance, welcome, inclusiveness, and mutual support." Caroline Parrot echoes B.J.'s feelings toward the ministry and encourages the congregation to support GIFT and Kingdom Kids' efforts in collecting shower supplies.

You can "Shower the Dwelling with Love" by dropping off completed Ziploc bags between now and Dec. 19. Individual items can be dropped off until Dec. 9, when GIFT will have a packing party. After that date, please only bring completed shower bags.

Items for each kit should include:

- Travel size or small bar of soap
- Travel size shampoo
- Travel size conditioner
- Travel size lotion
- Individually wrapped toothbrush
- Toothpaste
- Full-sized deodorant
- Comb
- Washcloth
- Lip balm
- Travel size facial tissue

Because bus rides to and from worship and the shower ministry can be provided with \$1 bills, we will be collecting dollar bills each Sunday to provide transportation, with the exception of Sunday, Dec. 5, which supports Buck-A-Meal at Rowan Helping Ministry.

A Chrismon Tradition The history and care of these very special gifts

A chrismon is the combination of two words: CHRISt and MONogram— a monogram of Christ. The plural is chrisma and the word is not capitalized. Over the years these symbols have developed so that a chrismon may be a monogram, a sign, a symbol, or a combination of such figures. The one requirement is that it refers primarily to our Lord and God.

The first chrismon tree was designed by Frances Spencer in Danville, VA, at Ascension Lutheran Church in 1957. Since then, the chrismon designs have traveled all over the world.

All chrismons are hand-made in combinations of white and gold. White, the liturgical color for Christmas, refers to the Lord's purity and perfection; gold, to His majesty and glory.

Each year the chrismon ladies at St. John's make a miniature chrismon for each child of the congregation and each homebound member. It is our hope that these will be kept for use and enjoyment for many years. Some families keep them well protected and at high school graduation, they are packaged and given to the child to take to college or wherever they go to begin their own life-long tradition. In fact, a miniature artificial tree would be a great graduation gift.

Questions arise as to how to properly store the chrismons. Since these are "treasures" and require much time, expense, and love to make, we hope the following ideas will help.

- 1. Chrismons are not generally placed on a regular Christmas tree with other ornaments. Each one has a specific meaning (explained on the card accompanying the chrismon). It would be a great opportunity to explain each one to the child as it is placed on their own miniature tree. Chrismons can also be used at other items—on the Advent wreath, places on a bare tree branch at Easter, or all year long.
- 2. When placing the chrismon on the tree, use regular ornament hangers to attach to the small loops and then hang on the tree. To prevent breakage, do not try to force the small loops over the limbs of the tree.
- 3. The wires are very delicate. Please remind the child not to bend them unnecessarily. If they need shaping after storage, be gentle.
- 4. Storage should be in an acid-free box with each one wrapped in either tissue paper or wax paper. They could be put in a plastic container IF wrapped first. They should not come in direct contact with plastic for storage purposed because the plastic will tarnish the beads.
- 5. Please keep in a dry, climate-controlled location (like a hall closet) rather than in a hot attic or damp basement.
- 6. Keep description/meaning of the chrismon with the box.

If properly cared for, the chrismons will last for years. Enjoy!

Rufty, who worked at Rufty's Chrismons beginning in the 1990s, was an icon of the business, and left the shop just two years ago. She died Aug. 20 at age 91.

support of her family of five children, nine grandchildren and four great-grandchildren, her holiday mints, her pound cakes she brought to work about every day. But her greatest legacy just might be found in her chrismon designs.

As the years went by, Rufty got to know her customers from all over the country — mostly women — by phone.



"They told her their life history over the phone," Melonie Beaver, her daughter and coworker, said in August. "She helped them through their problems as well as any help with the chrismons."

One of her many customers said, "The chrismons are how Barbara showed her love for her Lord and Savior."

So when you see chrismons around campus this

Christmas season, give thanks for the woman who played such an integral role in their creation.

you left her house hungry that it was your own fault.

As I got older, I started adding little things that she mentioned she needed, like large cans of coffee and cleaning supplies. Ministry History

St. John's partnership with Dar al Kalima University and Bright Stars of Bethlehem began in 2012/2013 after Rev. Dr. Mitri

Raheb spoke at a breakfast meeting at St. John's about his ministry initiatives as a Palestinian pastor. Dar al Kalima University's mission is to raise awareness and support to educate creative leaders in Palestine.

The Escuela Integrada school in Guatemala

Ministry History

Escuela Integrada began more than 17 years ago in Antigua, Guatemala, for children living in poverty. The name in English means "Integrated School for the Working Children." Escuela Integrada started as a school to serve children who were working on the streets and to offer them accessible education. GRACES (Guatemalan Relief Assistance for Children's Education Services) is a U.S-based nonprofit based in Salisbury, North Carolina, that supports and funds Escuela Integrada.

St. John's Support

St. John's has been partnering with the organization since 2011. The church has brought missions trips to volunteer with the organization over the years. In 2013, St. John's Lutheran Church retained the project as a mission of the Church. St. John's Lutheran Church worked to create a U.S.-based not for profit organization, GRACES, to fund the school. GRACES was then started in 2014. Additionally, the organization has received grants and funding from the church. Many members of the church also sponsor students through the organization and donate individually.

South Sudan

Ministry History

Sudan Rowan is a 501c3 founded in 2007 at St. John's. Sudan Rowan is an ecumenical Rowan County-based coalition that joins hands with South Sudanese partners in efforts to achieve peace and education. In 2010, Sudan Rowan began collaborating in a project called "Raising South Sudan" initiated by Charlotte-based 501c3 Mothering Across Continents. Under this project, former Lost Boys of Sudan have collaborated, sharing information and resources for schools and community development. Through their inspiration, and with anchor support from North Carolina schools, churches and foundations, nearly 1,000 children have attended primary schools in Ruweng State, South Sudan, and become models of "community schools" that have raised the education standards and aspirations in the region.

St. John's Support

- In the past 10 years, St. John's, through its endowment fund, has provided nearly \$30,000 to Sudan Rowan for scholarships, computer equipment, meals, teacher training, and teacher salaries.
- Thousands of dollars in support have been donated by congregants through individual donations.

- Sudan Rowan hopes to raise funds to repair the Gumriak roof blown off during the rainy season.

Rwanda

Ministry History

The Rwandan ministry is a partnership between St. John's and the parish church in Rukira. It stemmed from Carter Woolly's Young Adults in Global Missions (YAGM) year when he lived and worked out of the parish church office. In 2019, St. John's raised \$12,870 to assist with the construction of modern structures with the intent of housing a primary school next to the church. This would grow the Lutheran church's visibility in the community and provide a much-needed source of income for the church. So far, the project has stalled due to government hesitancy and the COVID pandemic, but they have been able to use the buildings for the church's preschool. The Lutheran Church in Rwanda is a small, growing group focused primarily on former Rwandan refugees from Tanzania who returned to the country following the 1994 genocide.

St. John's Support

St. John's provided \$12,870 towards the construction of buildings meant to house a primary school on adjacent to the church.
