Graduation Sunday is May 15!


As we near the end of the academic year, we are preparing for our annual recognition of our graduating seniors on Sunday May 15

275th Anniversary Celebration Continues

Celebrate the Story of Our Birthplace: the Old Lutheran Cemetery

Things might very well have turned out differently had the child lived. Land for a cemetery might never have been put aside, and thus, neither would there had been a place on that land for a community church. But the

child did unfortunately pass away in 1768 and wealthy Salisbury landowner John Lewis Beard and his wife Christina (Snapp), both of German descent, had to bury their daughter, whose name is unfortunately lost to history.

Salisbury had been named the county seat a decade prior, prompting the little village to grow and become quite busy. The Beards wanted their daughter to rest in a peaceful and

undisturbed place, so they chose the grove at the very edge of their property in East Ward, which they had previously purchased from William Temple Coles and his wife Sarah, as her burial place. That, in itself, would not ensure that the surrounding area would be protected from future residential and commercial encroachment, so they chose to give the property to the predecessor of St. John's, the German Lutheran Congregation, "to erect and build thereon a church, or meeting house" that would also establish and maintain a cemetery. Until that time, the German Lutheran Congregation had no physical space to call their own.

The deed for the property later specified "that any lawful minister of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, shall have liberty to preach in said church, if he can and do show a

sufficient testimonial, in writing, either from the High Church of England (Episcopal) or from the Reformed Calvin Ministers (Presbyterians)." A primitive log structure was erected to house church meetings, the cemetery grew, and the rest is history.

As part of our year-long celebration of the 275th anniversary of Lutheran worship in the region, you are invited to commemorate "Salisbury's First Church"

during an event at the "Old Lutheran Cemetery" on Sunday afternoon, June 26. Joining us will be our friends from St. Luke's Episcopal and First Presbyterian.

The cemetery is located at 515 N. Lee Street. The event begins at 4:00 and will conclude with Evensong and wine and cheese fellowship at St. Luke's. The Evensong liturgy is drawn from the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, which would have been in use at the time.

OLD LUTHERAN CEMETERY
Established 1768. Land given to German Lutheran congregation by John Lewis Beard.
Contains graves of German, Scotch-Irish, and English settlers. Site of only church building in Salisbury for about 50 years. Wall built 1878.

You will have an opportunity to peruse the graves of some of Salisbury and Rowan County's civic and governmental leaders of the time. Beginning at 4:15pm, retired Catawba Professor and St. John's member Dr. Gary Freeze will give brief comments about the history of the cemetery and its importance to not only St. John's but also the religious movement in Salisbury proper.

It's only fitting that the day end in worship service, giving homage to the three faith communities whose mutual working relationship can be traced back to that primitive log structure that once stood in the Old Lutheran Cemetery.



Dementia Care Training Team visits Bethlehem

A partnership between St. John's, Dar al-Kalima, and Lutheran Services Carolinas

A dementia care training team worked with nearly 50 individuals over four days March 14-17 at Dar Al-Kalima University College in Bethlehem.

Michael Connor led the team, and Deana Burris and Deb Tillman, two certified dementia care trainers from Trinity Oaks, led the training.

(My husband Jim and I went along as informal members of the team to provide communications and logistics support — and Jim supported Michael in working with a group of three ladies!)

In all, 26 healthcare professionals and 14 caregivers completed the training — there were two days of training for each group. This exceeded Connor's goal of 38 participants. Another goal under the "equip" category was that students increased their knowledge of dementia treatment and management. Under "empower," all of the caregivers and 90 percent of the medical professionals committed to train others within the rest of this year, well exceeding Connor's goal of 30 percent.

Under "enlighten," the team is working to complete articles and social media posts about the experience. Two additional training sites within two years are under consideration in the "expand" category.

Raeda Mansour, the intergenerational manager at Dar Al-Kalmia, was the on-site contact for the training. Her mother is in the final stages of Alzheimer's. Both of Mansour's sisters — all three are nurses attended the caregiver training segment.

"We have received good feedback within the community," she said April 20 during the post-training

meeting via Zoom.

The meetings were posted on Facebook Live and could be accessed throughout the West Bank and Gaza. The event was written up in five local newspapers, and Mansour was interviewed on local radio about the training.

"We had wide marketing about the training and what was going on," she said. "I'm looking forward to continuing together for future plans."

Mansour tentatively plans to visit the U.S. in September 2023 to attend a parish nurse conference. It is our hope

she will be able to visit St. John's. There are also plans under way to begin a caregiver support group for those who attended the training and others.

Tillman is in the process of sharing materials with Mansour, so that she can in turn share with others.

"The training was wonderful," Mansour said. "We greatly appreciate your passion and your love. I pray we continue in this ministry. I'm sure you felt it was a very needed ministry in our community. Four days of training is wonderful but it is not enough."

"They really made me feel like what I was saying was valued and important," Tillman said. "I was surprised by the lack of resources in dementia care."

Since she's been home, she's also been surprised that a lot of people don't know what resources are available here.

Burris agrees.

"The information was soaked up like a sponge by participants," she said. "I didn't expect so many people on our Trinity Oaks campus to ask for more information. There are a lot of opportunities for us to educate people here."

It's not only about educating families, Burris and Tillman agree, but also providing ongoing support.

Child Development Center Receives \$39,000 in Local Grants

Thanks to \$39,000 in local grants, an after-school tutoring program at the Child Development Center will continue this summer.

The project received \$18,000 from the N.C. Synod's Peeler/Casey Fund; \$10,000 from the Margaret C. Woodson Foundation; \$6,000 from the St. John's Endowment Fund; and \$5,000 from the Salisbury-Rowan Community Foundation.

The majority of the grant money will be used for salaries for two tutors, and half-scholarships for students. Additional funds will be used for resources and materials.

The two tutors are Otoneil Torres-Solano who works in the preschool during the morning, and the Rev. Thomas McDonald, a local pastor. Torrres-Solano, from Colombia, is bilingual, which has been a godsend, said Paula Levianu, the CDC's executive director. Both men have helped the students — ages 5 to 12 — with their homework as well as language and reading skills. Also on the agenda are educational games and word games such as Boggle.

"We have summer tutoring because we got a late start with the grant," Levianu said. "We want to combat that summer slump. Since the children won't have homework this summer, we'll be putting together book packs with books, workbooks, and other activities. We want to keep them reading."

Levianu said the program is going well so far with the 21 students who are enrolled.

"We won't know about test scores until later," she said, "but the kids love these tutors and look forward to them coming. They're a real asset. We all want to alleviate pressure on parents by trying to help our children get their homework done. I think the test scores are really going to show a difference."

The two men have also served as role models, and built relationships with the students, she said. "It's been great to have them here. It is needed for men to be in the childcare field and it's wonderful they're here."
