New Women's Ministry Launch is this Saturday


Because women crave to connect with other women, St. John's is launching a new women's ministry program.

Girls in Faith Together (GIFT) kicks off this Saturday, April 1, from 7 to 9 pm in the Faith Center. The evening will feature speaker and author Anna Rendell, worship, opportunities for rich conversation — and even a chocolate fountain!

"St. John's has a rich history with Women of the ELCA and women's circles," says Pastor Danielle. "We knew we needed a new season for women's ministry."

Rendell, who lives in Minnesota with her husband and three children, is a contributor to the recent book, "Craving Connection: 30 Challenges for Real-Life Engagement." She

also writes the GirlWith-Blog.com and is social media coordinator at incourage by Dayspring, a division of Hallmark. Through her blog and books, Rendell seeks to provide encouragement to women and mothers.



The GIFT ministry has been a year and a half in the making and has been a labor of love for the women's discipleship team: Sharon Agee, Carol Brown, Cathy Eller, Pat Epting, Scott Rhodes and Sally Taylor.

"The awesome part of this is that we received a significant Michael Peeler grant from the North Carolina Synod to kick off the ministry," Pastor Danielle adds.

Thanks to the grant, GIFT will host the April 1 event, along with a women's retreat April 27-29, 2018, at Bonclarken Conference Center in Flat Rock; summer circles; a fall concert featuring a female Christian singer/songwriter; and service opportunities.

The GIFT ministry has three goals: welcome, leadership, and community. All events will be open to women in the community.

A brainstorming event in April 2016, attended by women in the congregation of all ages, helped clarify the vision for women's ministry at St. John's. Priorities that emerged included small groups, a retreat, service projects, welcoming new people and supporting college women. During the kickoff, postcards will be written to all freshmen women at Catawba College, offering support and prayer as they prepare for final exams.

As noted in last month's Eagle's View, Mike Connor will be leaving in early April for a three month stint as an Ecumenical Accompanier (EA) in

Palestine. Mike leads the partnership with Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, pastored by our friend, the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb.

Mike has visited Mitri twice, once with a group he led from St. John's. He knows the challenges of peace in that most vulnerable region of the world. He's a passionate advocate for the Palestinian Christian community because of its unique voice in building bridges rather than walls between Jews, Christians, and Muslims.

But this is an entirely different opportunity for Mike. As an EA, Mike will walk the streets of Palestine, offer protective presence to vulnerable communities, while monitoring and reporting human rights abuses.

In other words, he'll get his hands dirty in what has become the very messy work of peace-making.

Talk about walking the talk.

The Ecumenical Accompaniment program is the work of the World Council of Churches. Mike will join 30 other volunteers chosen from around the world who serve for three months before returning to their church communities.

EAs come from all age groups, each of whom is committed to joining Palestinians and Israelis who work in nonviolent ways for peace. During the three months, Mike and the other EAs will interact with a myriad of international, Israeli and Palestinian partners.

Mike is a recently retired PhD working as a biostatistician for healthcare companies. His passions include discipleship, small group ministry, and global engagement. But his biggest passion is his family, especially his wife, B.J., and grandkids, two of whom are active members of St. John's. Oh, and we can't leave out his daughter and son-in-law, Nichole and Erron Towns. This is truly a special family.

They'll miss him these next twelve weeks. We will too, no doubt. But you can keep up with his adventure by adding your name to Mike's email list. He's been asked not to maintain a blog or post to social media, so he'll rely on email to tell the story. Old school, huh?

Solar Panels will generate 30 percent of the congregation's energy needs

There's an old song from the '80s that includes the lyrics, "The future's so bright, I gotta wear shades."

Mark Ritchie just might be donning sunglasses these days. His family recently purchased 199 solar panels, which have been installed on the roof of the educational building. When they go operational soon, the panels are expected to generate 30 percent of the church's energy needs.

The new system uses a net meter arrangement, so the church is billed on the difference of how much electricity it buys, minus what it generates, Ritchie says. "I'm glad to get it this close to being live."

The panels were purchased at the end of 2015, but the roof needed to be repaired, thus delaying the installation process of the panels.

Even with the delay, he says, it's a win-win situation. "This is environmentally the right thing to do, and it protects God's resources. Solar power is always available. It's a waste not to use it."

Ritchie's family will recoup parts of the project through solar tax credits and leasing equipment. The panels, visible from parts of Council Street, have a 25-year life span, after which the church can choose to replace them, as the technology will be improved and they'll likely generate even more power, Ritchie says.

"It's a real benefit to the church," says Mike Agee, who oversaw construction of the new building, which was constructed to be energy efficient.

The church is doing other things to be a good environmental steward, Agee says, including recycling, and the transition to paper products from Styrofoam. The new building uses LED lighting — which uses one-third the energy of fluorescent lights — with plans to purchase more throughout campus.

"Mark has been a driver throughout this process," Agee notes. "It's no doubt a big savings to the church, but it also just feels good. I couldn't be more pleased."



An aerial view of the 199 solar panels installed on the roof of the educational building. The panels already have generated a lot of conversation in the community, which was one of the goals of the project. "We hope to encourage broader interest in the many different forms of environmental stewardship available to us," says Pastor Rhodes. "There are a lot of flat roofs in Salisbury .. and way too many church dinners served on Styrofoam plates. Imagine the potential!"

A Brief History of Katie Luther

If ever there were a power behind the throne, none was stronger than Katharina von Bora, or "Dear Kate," as Luther described his beloved wife. Her story is full of drama: Born of the family finances. Their home was in a noble but poor family, Katharina was only three when she was sent away to school and eventually took vows to become a nun. In April 1523, with the Reformation well under way, Katharina and 11 of her fellow nuns hid in a wagon and escaped from their Cistercian convent. Once the wagon arrived in Wittenberg, she was taken in by the family of Lucas Cranach, the Elder.

Although Katharina was courted by two men, she married neither. In the end, she said that she would only marry Martin Luther.

Philipp Melanchthon, one of Luther's closest friends, was shocked at the idea of Luther marrying; he believed a wedding would cause a scandal that could severely damage the Reformation and its cause. On the other hand, Luther's father supported his son, as did Cranach. After pondering the matter for some time, Luther decided that "his marriage would please his father, rile the pope, cause the angels to laugh, and the devils to weep." The result was the joining of a 42-year-old former monk and a 26-year-old former nun in holy matrimony on June 13, 1525.

By all accounts, it was a happy and affectionate marriage. Luther wrote that he loved waking up to see pigtails on the pillow next to him. He also admired Katharina's intellect,

calling her "Doctora Lutherin." She bore six children, ran the household, and organized Wittenberg's Black Monastery, the former Augustinian monastery where Luther had lived before the Reformation began.



Katharina grew much of what they ate in her own private garden, raised livestock, cooked, and - perhaps most famously – brewed her own beer. To boost their income, she made good use of the extra rooms in the former monastery, opening a medieval guest house and offering room and board to as many as 30 paying students and visitors at a time. Katharina was trusted in ways unheard of for women in those days. Luther allowed her to deal with his publishers and made her his sole heir. Although we know little of Katies's own views about her unusual life, we do know that she loved her husband deeply. After his death in 1546, she wrote: "He gave so much of himself in service not only to one town or to one country, but to the whole world. Yes, my sorrow is so deep that no words can express my heartbreak, and it is humanly impossible to understand what state of mind and spirit I am in . . . I can neither eat nor drink, not even sleep . . . God knows that when I think of having lost him, I can neither talk nor write in all my suffering."

While fleeing the plague in Wittenberg in 1552, Katie died in Torgau after a terrible accident with her wagon and horses. She was 53 years old.

LSC Selected to Manage Continued Relief Efforts from Hurricane Matthew

Lutheran Services Carolinas (LSC) has been selected by the N.C. Dept. of Public Safety/Emergency Management to provide disaster case management in 45 North Carolina counties affected by the flooding of October 2016 caused by Hurricane Matthew.

For a period of three years, LSC will be the sole contractor providing case management services to assist flood victims in eastern North Carolina, 67,000 of whom have registered with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Using funds of \$ 2.2 million per year, LSC will hire up to 33 staff members, including 24 case managers to work with individuals in the FEMA-designated counties. Case managers will serve as points of contact to assess client needs and develop recovery plans.

"Most of the country has forgotten about Hurricane Matthew," said LSC President Ted Goins. "There is no greater need in North Carolina than to serve the 67,000 North Carolinians suffering from loss and dislocation. Lutheran Services Carolinas is honored and humbled to have the opportunity to walk with hurricane victims back to wholeness."

"I am incredibly excited about this extraordinary opportunity," says President Whitt. "The bedrock principles that are unique to Lenoir-Rhyne are values I enthusiastically embrace and support. Donate to the St. John's Tent Village at Lutheridge

St. John's has been asked to raise \$50,000 to fund a new platform tent village at Lutheridge. The church has already received \$20,000 towards the project.

Adding the four elevated tree-house style platform tents will serve the camp's High School Outdoor Adventure Program in several ways:

- The Outdoor Adventure Program at Lutheridge has grown during the past 15 years, outgrowing the four platform tents already in place. The new tent village will give the program more room to grow in the coming summers.
- Adding the tent village will free up cottages to increase Lutheridge's growing adult and family programming.

■ The new elevated tent village will have a "wow" factor, much like the new pool, attracting campers and helping retain current campers. Any commitments over \$50,000 will go toward remodeling restrooms in Lakeside Lodge.

A group of six St. John's members is serving as the steering team for the project. They are Mike and Sharon Edwards, Harrison Parrott, Dave Roof, Cora Shinn, and Anna Grace Woolly. Although a more formal campaign will be held later this year, donations can be directed to the project even now.

Students Visit "Luther Land"

Rebecca Agner, Caroline Parrott, and Victor Pereira were among a group of 48 students and chaperones who traveled to Germany with the University of North Carolina's Lutheran Campus Ministry program during spring break in March.

During a four-year cycle, students visit Germany, New Orleans, Costa Rica and Miami, explains Fred Black, a member of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Chapel Hill, and frequent trip chaperone.

"This year was the time to go to Germany," he says, "so it was perfect."

Here are the St. John's students' reflections from this memorable trip:

Germany was amazing! As a Lutheran, visiting the cities where Martin Luther was born, lived, and preached was a surreal experience. Since 2017 is the 500th year of the Reformation, there were even more Luther-related memorials and shops to visit than there normally would have been!

We brought a very large group of about fifty people, mostly UNC students, but three students from that "other blue school about 8 miles down the road." Having a travel group this big posed many challenges, especially in the airports. However, we broke into smaller travel groups, which made the large size more manageable, and helped us become closer to the students in our travel groups.

One of my favorite experiences was exploring and living in the Mansfeld Castle for two days. Luther's parents lived in Mansfeld, and he visited this castle often. There is speculation that the castle inspired the lyrics to the famous hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God," since Luther would have seen the castle that overlooks the city of Mansfeld below. Assuming this speculation was true, our group sang the hymn about five different times while living in the castle, which was so much fun!

I am very blessed to have been able to explore Germany with such a wonderful group of UNC family. I am very thankful to my St. John's family as well, since St. John's was where I first learned about Luther and experienced the joys of Christian fellowship.

I appreciate how God gives us signs in our life, such as the signs He gave me that I was meant to travel to Germany with an excellent group of fellow Christians this year. This semester, I have two classes based on medieval literature — highly centered around the Protestant Reformation — and we, Carolina Choir, are singing the Verdi Requiem, a piece sang by a group of imprisoned Jews in Tere-

zin. I perceive these events not as coincidences, but signs that God nudged me toward learning about Luther and heading to Germany.

Being in Germany during the 500th anniversary of the Reformation felt to me like an experience discerning efficacy. In other words: anybody in our time could be, like Martin Luther, an important laborer in God's work that might affect how Christians worship centuries from today. 500 years ago, Martin Luther did God's work to combat the corrupt system of indulgences and to conceive the notion of a personal relationship with God.

Presumably, he would not have known how significant his contribution to Christianity would be today, how much he would have influenced us to worship God with a true love that, arguably, might not exist today. We must learn from Luther's life and focus on our faithbased efficacy.

Learning about Luther's life was wonderful, but my favorite site was the Mansfeld Castle where our group stayed for two nights. It was in this place where I realized how traveling in such a large group would usually prove overwhelming, but not with LCM. When we arrived, we quickly packed our luggage in our rooms and explored the castle. It felt like everyone was in tune with one another on how extraordinary our experience was so far; I mean seriously, we were in a castle.

We had the open yards and ruins to ourselves to play Ultimate Frisbee, build a bonfire, and sit cliffside watching the sun set over rolling fields and 10 different church steeples. That mighty fortress overlooking the land of Germany, all to ourselves. But most importantly, it felt like God was there giving us His grace by providing such an irreplaceable experience with each other. I thank God greatly for having given us all such a beautiful place to stay, as well as excellent tour guides and castle keepers whom I consider royalty.

Lastly, traveling with a large group did prove difficult when flying between countries. It was especially difficult in London, the midpoint between our Germany and U.S. flights. Again, I strongly believe that this would have proved unbearable were it not for our LCM group that stuck together and fought through such a trying delay in our travels. Our first flight cancellation was difficult because we had to stay in London-Heathrow all day. However, the second time we were stuck in London-Heathrow, everything worked out for everybody; some of us went straight home, others stayed overnight in different U.S. cities, and a few of us stayed to explore London, an unforgettable city.

Each different situation had one thing in common: a group of people, led by God, that provided each other with a comforting pres-

ence. As always, things are OK at the end.

I cannot express how blessed I feel to have been a part of this unforgettable experience. Not many people get the chance to make a trip like this in their lifetime. To travel and learn about Luther's life during the 500th anniversary of the Reformation is a solidification of my Lutheran faith through God. Yes, the Lutheran faith is centered on God, not Martin Luther, but to learn about a person that so loyally followed God's will is to learn about how we, as people of today, can advance the notion of a personal relationship with God.

Thank you to all who made this trip possible for us.

Being in Germany during the 500th anniversary of the Reformation was an incredible experience that I will never forget. The most powerful moment for me was standing in the room where Luther translated the Bible and knowing that coming out of that room would be millions of followers and my faith practices.

My favorite moment was staying in Schloss Mansfeld, the castle on the hill in Martin Luther's hometown. Many people believe that "A Mighty Fortress" was written based on Wartburg Castle, but Martin Luther grew up seeing Schloss Mansfeld every day from his home in Mansfeld. It is feasible to believe that "A

Mighty Fortress" could have been inspired by the castle where we stayed. Naturally, our group chose to sing "A Mighty Fortress" in the fortress, which left me speechless.

Our travels did not go as planned, thanks to the strike at the airport in Berlin. Due to our large group, we crashed the computers in London, and it took seven hours to get new boarding passes to Hannover. We were all very stressed, irritable, and anxious, but we became pros at all of the card games you can imagine — after playing for 15 hours straight! When we thought we would have zero troubles coming home, our group crashed the computers again in Berlin, thus delaying our takeoff time to London. We missed our flight from London to Raleigh, so our group was divided into eight groups and flew into four different airports across the United States. I was selected to stay an extra night in London and fly to Raleigh the following day, which led to a spontaneous trip into the city and viewing as much as we could before heading to bed for our early flight. Even though I had no luggage or toiletries, that ended up being one of the highlights of my trip!

I look forward to going back and revisiting all of the beautiful cities that contributed to shaping my faith journey.


