Salisbury Symphony to Perform at St. John's on September 23

The Salisbury Symphony joins in the 500th anniversary celebration by performing in the historic St. John's sanctuary on September 23 at 7:00 pm. Tickets are on sale through the Symphony website and at Seasons Gifts.

In addition to performing Mendelsohn's Reformation Symphony and JS Bach's cantata on "A Mighty Fortress," the symphony will premiere Davis Brown's Symphony No. 1 in D Major at its September 23 concert.

"A milestone of this magnitude deserves a performance of this magnitude," Pastor Rhodes says. "Mendelsohn's Reformation Symphony is stunning, and Davis's composition sits beautifully right next to it."

Davis, 50, has been composing music for 40 years, and is keyboardist with the 9:27 worship team. He says the first draft of Symphony No. 1 was in celebration of the unification of Germany after the fall of communism in 1990. He

eventually laid the work aside, and got to know the director of a community orchestra in St. Louis, where he was teaching. A professor of political science, he at present is conducting research work for a couple of organizations. He has a PhD in international relations but no formal degree in composition.

"The director asked me to re-orchestrate the piece a little to accommodate the orchestra," he says. "Later, I thought, why not redraft it entirely as a tribute to the 500th year of the Reformation. It sits very well with a piece already with a German theme. So that is what I did."

He showed the work to Rob Durocher and then the two of them showed it to Maestro David Hagy as a possibility for the upcoming concert.

"Rob and David agreed to perform the third movement," Davis says, "which is how it got on the program."

Pastor's Letter



Dear friends,

I'm in the early stages of study for our upcoming sermon series entitled "We Can't Stay Here: the life and times of Moses." I've always loved the book of Exodus, and this series gives us another chance to dive immeasurable importance in our journey of faith.

One of the themes we'll

wrestle with is the remarkable sense of irony throughout the book of Exodus — the ways God the most unlikely people to bring about radical change. Think about the first two chapters alone, when God uses five women to save Israel from the brutality of Pharaoh.

God then uses Moses, a slave's baby who faced sure and certain death ... and his young sister, Miriam, who went to the river that day armed with a plan that would deliver all of Israel.

Irony and surprise is everywhere.

We're facing some challenges these days, aren't we. Nationally, sure; but I'm thinking mostly about the challenges we face as a community.

Last Friday night I had dinner with the retired police commander of Hickory who asked, "What's going on in Salisbury?"

There's no doubt that Salisbury has elements of being that quintessential Southern town described in a "Bury Home Companion." The lovely sense of home, the rich appreciation of history, and the beauty of culture surround us in Salisbury.

But so does the sound of gunfire and the daily reminder that local drug addiction has taken a heavy, heavy toll.

Irony.

One of the things I love most about Exodus is the way God surprises us over and over again, using the most unexpected of people to do remarkably liberating things.

Who are we to suggest that God might not be ready to do the same thing here in Salisbury? Might God be preparing unexpected persons to rise up and be messengers of liberation and peace? One never knows.

deeply into a story that is of One thing I've noticed about Salisbury is that we tend to go to the same people over and over again for answers, contributions, and leadership. No doubt, many of these folks have been incredibly wise and generous over the years.

> But as I look into the future, I find myself praying that God might be preparing someone like Miriam to be the next source of inspira-

> I wonder who that could be. Might it be you? Might it be someone you currently mentor? One never knows.

> Another thing I've learned over the years: don't underestimate the power of young people. And don't question God's use of Divine Irony to bring hope and inspiration to people living in darkness.

So, what do we do in challenging times like these?

Here's a suggestion: like Miriam, let's imagine a future that is filled with hope and possibility for all, not just a few.

And like Miriam, let's dare to let God use us — yes, us — as his agents of hope for this weary world. As ironic and surprising as that may be.

Thanks for your partnership, friends. I'll see you in church.

Congregation-wide Work Project at Salisbury High, Sept 9-10

After completing projects at elementary and middle schools, St. John's Serves this year will be working at Salisbury High School. The event is set for two days, 9 am to noon on Saturday, Sept. 9, and noon-3 pm on Sunday, Sept. 10. A sub lunch will be served on Sunday.

"We want to continually support our public schools," says Pastor Danielle DeNise, St. John's former pastor for discipleship, who led the community outreach project since its inception. "We thought that the high school was a nice next step. Salisbury High's principal, Luke Brown, recently joined St. John's, so it is a nice partnership between our church and the school."

Sandra Sullivan, a teacher at Salisbury High School, says the project received \$1,000 from St. John's, plus an additional \$250 from Elizabeth Derrick, who applied for a Thrivent community grant.

Over two days, volunteers will landscape a student picnic area, which includes leveling the area, setting railroad ties, and mulching. Volunteers will also paint two art rooms which have moved to a new location, plant flowers, and pack teacher gift bags.

As usual, Sandra notes, there is something for every skill and ability level. She adds, "And it's fine to come to church on Sunday morning dressed for work!"

As an extra bonus, the school's technology facilitator will be on hand to give members a tour of the technology and engineering departments. "We want our members to see what we are doing at Salisbury High School," Sandra says.

Sandra was thrilled to know that her school — she's taught there for 28 years, spending only one year away with her husband's work — was chosen for St. John's Serves.

"It was an immediate yes to participate on my part," she says. "We have so many members of St. John's in the Salisbury High School community. My parents went there, and my brother and I went there. To support this school is extremely important to me. We'd love to have people come out and see what our school is about, and all the good things we are doing."

You might have noticed over the years that St. John's has perhaps more than its share of teachers. So much so that Pastor Rhodes is fond of saying, "St. John's is the place for teachers!"

Kelly Everhart adds, "St. John's is also the place to be if you want to be a principal."

He points out that four of the county's seven high school principals are St. John's members. Luke Brown is at Salisbury High School, Meredith Williams is at North Rowan High School, Maria Lowder is the executive director is at North Hills Christian School, and Tonya Brinegar-German has recently been tagged as the new principal at East Rowan High School.

"St. John's has been a real big supporter of the school system, pubic education and educators in Rowan County," says Kelly, a longtime coach and teacher at North Rowan. "And we absolutely appreciate it."

"Each day as I enter my school building, I am reminded of the importance of the connection between our faith life and our daily actions," Tonya says. "St. John's helps me to connect the reason why I do the work each day in my school and my daily work. I know I always have my faith family at St. John's that I can call on when I need assistance in doing my work at East Rowan. Whether it be through

collection of supplies, providing helping hands for a campus clean-up, or lifting our schools in prayers, our church has become a vital faith-based partner for our local schools."

"Personally, St. John's has been a place where I am challenged to work for God's kingdom in every aspect of my life, including my work-life," Meredith says. "From worship to small groups, I find members who support my calling and provide both wisdom and encouragement through the tough patches. I consider

the work that teachers, administrators, staff, and coaches carry out in schools to be mission work serving the students in community in a very Christ-like way of teaching, loving, and sometimes even witnessing miracles!"

Meredith continues, "St. John's Benevolent Foundation has supported North Middle School specifically by funding a day where every student in the school got to visit a college campus. It was a fantastic experience to have a completely empty school and be able to report, at the end of the school day, that North Rowan had gotten every student to college! Recently, a theater program has blossomed at North Middle. The Benevolent Foundation also supported their first production of Aladdin Junior. This show opened the eyes of our community to the talent and passions of our students in ways that aren't typically witnessed in the classroom. St. John's love and generosity made all of these enriching activities possible for our students and teachers."

And Salisbury High School will benefit from the St. John's Serves project, set for Sept. 9-10 (see article on page 3)

"It's so nice to see my church and school communities intertwined and embrace each other," says Sandra Sullivan, who teaches at Salisbury High. "It just makes my heart full."

For the past several years, Melissa Rhyne has led Vacation Bible School with a hardworking team of dozens of volunteers.

"I believe the role of a teacher is not only to educate but also to create an environment where God can transform us into the people God wants us to be," says Melissa, who teaches kindergarten at North Rowan Elementary School. "St. John's helped me understand how God wants to use me in my classroom and gives me a purpose. VBS at St. John's has helped inspire me to be a better teacher. I have always felt great support from St. John's for helping lead VBS and my job as a teacher."

The little town of Wittenberg:

How an otherwise unknown town became the center of the Reformation

Known as the "Birthplace of the Reformation", Martin Luther played the most important roles of his life in Lutherstadt Wittenberg, from monk, student, professor, and priest to husband, father, author, and reformer. Legend has it that Luther nailed his 95 Theses to Wittenberg's Castle Church door, an act that would go down in history as the beginning of the Reformation. While the original wooden door no longer stands, a massive bronze memorial door marks the spot that changed the course of history.

The city's renowned university also has close ties to the Great Reformer. Martin Luther received his doctorate in theology from Wittenberg University in 1512, where he studied side-by-side with some of the greatest intellectuals of his time – including his good friend, Philipp Melanchthon. After graduating, he went on to serve as professor of Bible studies at his beloved alma mater. The Augusteum, which was built in in 1580 as an addition to the university, is now one of Germany's oldest university buildings and the gateway to the famous Luther House.

Appropriately, Luther is buried underneath the pulpit of the Castle Church in Wittenberg.



Like other pieces in the concert, his piece includes Martin Luther's famous hymn, "A Mighty Fortress."

"It's not the main theme," Davis notes, "but it does appear recognizably in the middle, and then is quoted at the end."

When composing, Davis says he usually has a pretty good idea of where he wants to go with a piece, constructing it from the beginning to the end. "Sometimes I will write something and it looks like on paper it would work. Then I do a mini-recording and it doesn't sound right, or it sounds emptier than I thought. So then I tweak the orchestration, changing a note here or there to get the effect I want. But my first path through, I usually get about 97 percent of its final form."

What makes that possible, he explains, is thinking through a piece before he puts notes on paper — or the computer.

As for the symphony premiere, he says, "obviously it's going to be exciting. It's exciting for any composer to have a premiere in the place where he lives. This is the first time that a work of mine has been performed by the Salisbury Symphony. So it's rather fortuitous."

For the symphony, it's a chance for its musicians to leave the concert hall and go out in the community, says James Harvey, executive director of the Salisbury Symphony. "We are honored to be asked to take part in the collaboration with St. John's. It's outside our regular season, but it's a key event in our calendar. St. John's is a wonderful church that strives to make our community an artistically vibrant place."

Oprah Winfrey Donates Items to Quetzal Gala Auction

Oprah Winfrey has donated two items for auction at an upcoming gala next month in Salisbury.

A pair of Nicholas Kirkwood pumps and a pair of Dita designer sunglasses will be up for grabs during the Quetzal Gala on Sept. 16 at the Country Club of Salisbury. This event raises money for the students of Escuela Integrada, a school in Antigua, Guatemala.

GRACES is the Salisbury-based non-profit organization that oversees and raises funds for the school. A connection with GRACES brought about the donation from Winfrey, the entertainment mogul consistently ranked as one of the world's wealthiest women.



One of GRACES' supporters has a friend who worked for Winfrey at Harpo Studios, her former production company. The friend put Paula Bohland, GRACES' executive director, in touch with Winfrey's staff.

"I wrote the email of my life," Bohland said Thursday morning. "I sent information about our organization and a request for a donation for our gala. I had to keep it short enough and interesting enough to hold their attention. We sent it, and very quickly, we heard back that they were considering it."



With the items came a printed copy of Bohland's email, with a handwritten greeting across the top: "Best wishes for a great event!" Winfrey signed the inside of the shoes and the temple and case of the sunglasses. The shoes are a European size 41, equivalent to size 9½ to 10.

"Our organization is a good quality organization," Bohland said. "The fact that Oprah Winfrey gave this donation affirms for me the good work we're doing. She's been a person in my life who inspires me, and to have her give us these items is amazing. It shows me how abundant our God is."

Bohland posted the good news on Facebook Wednesday evening, she said. "We sold a lot of tickets that night."

Interest in the event has soared, she said. "I'm honored that Oprah looked at our organization and helped us out. This gives our event credibility and generates additional excitement. Supporters will be coming to Salisbury from all over the country, and Oprah's spirit will be right there with us."

"The Disciple Bible Study has helped me to grow in my understanding of the Bible more than any other religion class I ever took," Brenda Munday says. "Pastor Rhodes excels in explaining the background and time of the writings, giving a new meaning to the words. I loved it so much, I volunteered to be a leader in the class the following year!"

Franco Goodman says that Disciple was a class he always wanted to take, but never felt he had the time to do so. "It was worth every meeting," he says. "It was informative, but the best part was the relationships we developed as a

group. Reading the Bible together weekly gave us a new perspective on the Bible. I would certainly highly recommend it to anyone who wants to learn and discern the Bible better. In church many Sundays, I'll hear a scripture reading that I understand even more having taken the class. It was a sacrifice that was well worth it."

I had the privilege of taking the class with two of my coworkers at the time, Ruth Ann Diehl, who remains our business manager, and Karen Goodman.

"The Bible stories I knew became so much more meaningful and rich as we studied them together," Ruth Ann says. "The experience stays with you long after the classes have been completed."

I agree with Ruth Ann. I've pulled out my class materials several times over the years. It's a lot of reading and writing — both of which I love — but it's well worth the investment in time and effort to better connect faith and life together.
