Trinity Living at St. John's Kicks Off Aug. 13

Trinity Living at St. John's — the county's first church-based respite care program — kicks off Aug. 13. A collaboration between Trinity Living Center and St. John's, the program will be housed in The Pit, in the lower level of the Faith Center.

Respite care is open to people ages 60 and up with cognitive impairment but who can still perform the activities of daily living (eating, toileting, medications, etc.).

The ministry offers caregivers a much-needed break from the constant care of a loved one at home. This is a social program, so there is no medical staff onsite. The patient-tovolunteer ratio will be 6:1, and the program manager will schedule care in advance to ensure enough volunteers are present each day.

Christina Joyce, executive director of Trinity Living Center, says that both participants and volunteers have signed up for the program. More space is available for both participants and volunteers. Joyce adds that the agency has hired Cynthia Hubbard as the onsite program manager.



Hours are 9 am-1 pm Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. The cost is \$30 per day and includes a breakfast bar and a hot lunch. Activities will include art, music, games, and intergenerational programs.

Pastor's Letter



My bees didn't make it this year. Call it bad weather, bad luck, bad beekeeping, or maybe the vicious assault of neighboring mustached bees that were remarkably coordinated in their attack.

Bottom line: We won't have honey this year.

Which is a bummer. To be honest, I didn't get off to a good start. Well, let me back

up. I bought the right materials, shadowed Nathan Hough and his uber-beekeeper grandmother, found the perfect spot on the St. John's roof, right next to the solar panels. Everything seemed perfectly in place ... except that, for whatever reason, they didn't make enough honey. And, as I later found out, I didn't do enough to keep them interested.

When we inspected the bees a few weeks ago, it didn't look pretty. Robber bees had taken over. The queen and her worker bees were long gone. All that remained was some beeswax and a vacancy sign.

Lesson learned: Sometimes things don't turn out as planned.

Or sometimes it just takes a little while for things to get started.

I've run across kids who I thought might not make it out of high school .. only to become outstanding students and professionals in their careers.

I once worked with a musician in Virginia who, so it seemed, had very few skills in church music .. only to later discover a new passion in jazz music. It just took him a while to get things right.

I'm thinking of Mary Magdalene, whom the world had dismissed as a crazy, demon-possessed woman. But Jesus saw something else in her. He gave her the time and nurturing that she needed and watched her grow into the first witness of the resurrection.

For a few days, I was ready to give up on beekeeping. But perhaps I'm being invited into a place of patience and endurance. After all, what has been sown, God says in Isaiah 43, *will grow*. "For as the rain and snow fall down from heaven and nourish the earth ... so shall be my word. It will flourish."

So I guess I'll give these bees another chance. Which means that next year this time, get ready for some yummy honey, friends. You can count on it!

Preview Financial Peace University on Sept. 13

Some 64 percent of Americans cannot cover a \$1,000 emergency.

Imagine if you did not have car payments. Imagine if your kids never knew debt. Imagine if you and your spouse did not fight about money.

Debt is normal. Be weird!

Dozens of St. John's members have benefitted from Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University. A second installment of the program is set for 6:30-8:30 pm Thursdays, Sept. 20 - Nov. 15. A preview class will take place at 6:30 pm Sept. 13.

Topics include Super Saving, Relating With Money, Cash Flow Planning, Dumping Debt, Buyer Beware, The Role of Insurance, Retirement and College Planning, Real Estate and Mortgages, and The Great Misunderstanding.

These sessions are co-sponsored by St. John's and Christ United Methodist Church. Class facilitators are Wayne and Jill Nelson of St. John's and Wayne Smith of Christ.

Nelson heard a lot about stewardship when he served on the Synod staff, and he and his wife took a course sponsored by Mount Hermon Lutheran Church.

"It was an affirmation for us that we have been doing things right," he says.

They saw others get excited about the program, and decided to offer it at St. John's.

"We had an extremely balanced class," he says. "We had young singles, and women who were widows. We encouraged families with kids to participate."

In all, 40 people participated in the class last year — the Nelsons were hoping for six couples. Members of that class will be serving as small group leaders this fall.

"I really enjoyed the class," says Kristin May, who is single. "It

forced me to really look at where my money was going and, I'm not going to lie, it was a little shocking. I had gotten in the habit of putting expenses on the credit card and paying it off. I love the envelope system because I know exactly where I stand and how much money I have left on food or entertainment, to name a few categories.

"I have paid off a lot of my debt, saved money in an emergency fund, and know that whatever life throws at me, financially, I can tackle it!"

Doug and Donna Groce, who married six years ago, took the class together.

"This class came highly recommended," she says. "Wayne and Jill are terrific facilitators and lead by example. The instruction and tips from the course book and video, and the lively and insightful group discussions have really made our spending and saving habits more intentional."

"I'm very much on my own," says Debbie Martin, whose husband, David, died four years ago. "This is a different time in my life. Financially, David was my cushion. I never worried about money, because he always provided well. Once he was gone, it felt like the world was a different place. I had to learn there were going to be new dreams, and I wanted to get ready."

Martin had worked as a branch office assistant with Edward Jones.

"I have seen the habits of people with large amounts of money and how they operate," she says. "But this class was a down-to-earth perspective of managing money. I learned more about the day-to-day habits of spending. It was helpful and realistic. Everybody in the class found something that applied to them."





According to rssed.org, each year, Rowan County-Salisbury Schools impact the lives of 19,000 students and 3,000 teachers, and students spend an average of 1260 hours at school in one year, not counting extra curricular activities, time riding the bus, or before and after school lets out.

Teachers put in countless hours to help our children succeed in learning and developing, purchase most of the items in their classroom out of their own pockets, and help keep our children safe and healthy while at school. For some students in our own community, the only food, attention, and healthcare they receive is provided at school. Each day, our children and teens' lives are touched by teachers, administrators, lunch aides, maintenance staff, counselors, coaches, and volunteers. No doubt their lives are touched by the students as well. The fact of the matter is during school hours may be the only chance to experience the love of Jesus for students and staff alike.

A sign behind the desk of Melissa Rhyne, St. John's member and kindergarten teacher at North Rowan Elementary School, puts it this way, "God doesn't have to be in my curriculum to be in my classroom. After all if He is in me, He is in everything I do... and I never have to say His name."



Teller Teams We Count On

For years, the "Tellers Team" has been a key component of giving at St. John's.

"We used to count the money ourselves," says a former church office worker who's now a team member, "but we were robbed at gunpoint many years ago. And Pastor Carl Sachtleben thought it would be a good idea for the staff not to count the money, because of confidentiality concerns."

That's where the teller team had its beginnings.

Ruth Ann Diehl, business manager, said that when she started at St. John's in 2000, two members, Grace Millar and Cullen Lentz, had been doing it for years — and it had gotten to be overwhelming.

Four teams of two-person tellers were formed. The teams rotate through fifth Sunday duties. Each week, a team gathers in a secure location to count cash and checks. Most have backgrounds in either banking or business.

The work they do is timesaving for the staff, Diehl says. And it's an opportunity to serve and stay active, physically and mentally, she says. It's also a time of fellowship among team members and with the church staff. Lentz trained another longtime member of the teller team, and he in turn has trained a number of volunteers.

This teller was a regional manager for 23 stores in three states.

"In my job, I would check cash registers to make sure the correct money was in there, as well as the safe," he says, "so this kind of work was part of my professional life. I enjoy it as a service to the church."

Another team member had 22 years of banking experience before going into sales for a national company.

"When I was asked to serve, it just fell right in line with what I did in my career," he says. He's now been on the team for five years.

Another retired banker has a similar story. "I have a heart to give. Paul Carter was getting ready to retire from the team, and he trained me. As I get older, I'm limited in how I can volunteer. This is something I can do. I've had the same partner for four years, and we always call and remind each other when it's our turn to serve."

Introducing New Ways to Give at St. John's

"Text Giving" joins online and regular giving options

This summer, St. John's introduced a new way to give. In addition to using offering envelopes and our website, you can now give by texting.

With less and less people carrying cash and checks, this is another option to make giving more convenient, and you don't need internet access to give once you register. This can also be a good way to teach teens with their first jobs about tithing, in a way that is convenient and makes sense to them.

Just text the amount you wish to give to 704.802.1349. The first time you give, you will be prompted to set up your payment method. After that's been set up, you can just text the amount to 704.802.1349. You will receive a confirmation text each time. You also have the option to set up automatic recurring gifts.

Text giving allows you to give to specific funds, as well. Just type *funds* to receive a list of funds. If you know how to text, you will find it to be user friendly and intuitive. Once you text

the number, you are prompted with any instructions you may need. The texting option includes other keywords that will offer assistance, allow you to edit your payment, refund your gift, etc. You can probably guess most of the keywords. For instance, for instructions, type *assist* and to edit, type *edit*.

You can find more detailed instructions in our Ways to Give brochure in the tract racks or online, at stjohns-salisbury.org/ giving. The brochure also provides helpful refreshers on other ways to give, including tips that help the teller volunteers

with their jobs tremendously.



The St. John's Museum *Exhibit Coming This Fall*

To continue the commemoration of the 250th Reformation in Rowan, St. John's will launch its heritage museum in 2018 by celebrating the act of benevolence that established our congregation in Salisbury.

The John Lewis Beard deed of 1768 provided land for the location of a church - the first to be built in Salisbury - in the eastern square of the new county seat. The site was in a grove on the edge of the village where he had recently buried • a beloved daughter. (Today this is the area we call the Lutheran Cemetery, where many of Salisbury's early settlers were buried, including some of the founders of our congregation.)

The exhibit will interpret:

• The background of the German settlement of the area

that began about 1747 (the traditionalized origin date we use in our history).

- Salisbury's role as the "orderly" capital of the North Carolina backcountry (hence it being named after England's oldest city).
- The cultural traits and habits of the nearby "Dutch Side" neighborhoods like that around Organ Church (particularly the influence of the polymath Stirewalt family).
- The political context of the North Carolina Regulation, a taxpayer revolt that roiled the backcountry (which prompted official British support for an "orderly" German church in Salisbury).
- The service provided to the Salisbury Church (which was never called St. John's in that period) by it's first established Lutheran pastors during the American Revolution.

Construction Begins on Bell Tower Green *Changes to Sunday Morning Parking Addressed*

The time has come. The parking lot across the street from St. John's is no longer available. Groundbreaking on the project officially began July 23.

Although the parking lot was never owned by St. John's, it has long been available for community use, including Sunday worship. The plans for the park include the elimination of the parking lot, but the addition of angled parking along Church, Fisher, and Jackson streets once the project is completed.

St. John's Parking Task force has identified 85 marked parking spots on the St. John's campus, not counting the old K-Town gravel lot, which can accommodate at least 15 cars for a total of 100 spaces on campus. There are 17 in the CMC lot, 29 in the CDC lot, 26 in the Sanctuary/Ed. Building lot, and 13 in the Peeler Hall lower level lot. An additional 230 public parking spaces were identified within one block of St. John's, for a total of 330 spaces available on Saturdays and Sundays.

Parking spaces are indicated on the map on the opposite page. Additionally, Mike Agee is working on an updated 3-D map to help with navigation and parking here at St. John's.

The Parking Task Force continues to look into possible parking solutions as we live into our new reality, particularly until the new spaces are provided, with as much hospitality as possible.

One way we can work together in hospitality and love is to make sure the spaces outside the education hall and

sanctuary are available for elderly and handicapped on Sunday mornings and all other congregation-wide activities, including events like Wednesday Meals beginning next month (page 24). We are also considering purchasing a multipassenger golf cart.

Another way we can live out our hospitality is by welcoming the new city park, which will essentially be our new front yard. In addition to thinking about our own parking limitations, we can begin thinking about the opportunities for community partnership, engagement, and ministry that can come from having a beautiful community space situated right in front of our door steps.

Local Child Advocate Program Seeks Volunteers


