Just like the good ol' camp song says, this year's theme for the Churchwide Retreat at Lutheridge is "Light."

"We hope that people will recognize themselves as the light of Christ, and move that light back to Salisbury, to be light in our community," says Michael DeNise, who chairs the retreat planning committee.

This year's retreat is set for Oct. 5-7. Registration is available online, and the deadline is Sept. 9.

The churchwide retreats — in which St. John's has the use of the entire camp — began in 2009, when Pastor Rhodes joined the St. John's staff. They've continued mostly on a bi-annual basis, although a retreat did not take place in 2017 because of the Reformation anniversary, Michael notes.

This year's retreat will include a focus on St. John's global mission partners: Guatemala, Palestine, South Sudan, and Rwanda. Lubo and Ngor from South Sudan and Hernan and





Elvia from Guatemala will be on hand for the weekend. Michael hopes to be able to FaceTime Carter Woolly, who will be serving in Rwanda.

Activities surrounding these four mission partners will take place Friday evening during the ministry fair, and they'll also be incorporated as part of the Saturday morning Bible study, led by Pastors Rhodes and Laura.

The weekend will follow its traditional format, with vespers both evenings and concluding worship on Sunday morning. This year's service project features a rock painting project in the Faith Center on Saturday afternoon. The event follows the "kindness rocks" or "traveling rocks" trend of placing rocks in public places for people to find. But Michael says that folks can paint these rocks of encouragement to share with friends who may need them — another way of sharing light in the community once they return home.

Saturday afternoon free time offerings include canoeing at lake side, a hike nearby, area tourism opportunities, and a tour of the St. John's Tent Village. Completed in time for the 2018 summer season, the village is the first and only camp area named for a congregation.

Michael won't yet reveal the entertainment for Saturday evening, but does promise that a good time will be had by all.

Pastor's Letter



Dear friends,

Let me jump into a topic that you might prefer I keep quiet about: Fame.

As you know, a beautiful bronze

statue, originally cast in Belgium, was dedicated in 1909 to honor fallen Confederate soldiers. Over these last 109 years, the "angel statue" has become part of Salisbury's cultural landscape, all the while attracting frustration from those who don't think the city should be honoring the Confederate cause.

It's a touchy issue, no doubt, made even more complicated because the statue and the plot of land upon which it sits belongs to the Daughters of the Confederacy (DOC).

Let's be brutally honest: this issue isn't going away. Something will happen ... either in the spirit of consensus or through mob rule (remember Silent Sam?) I hate the thought of it, but we simply cannot eliminate the possibility of two factions marching toward the statue from opposite ends of Innes Street, landing directly in front of St. John's Church. A frightening possibility.

Two thoughts come to mind.

How can we form consensus over such a divisive issue? That's what leaders do: they seek consensus if consensus can be found. Sometimes it cannot - for moral or ethical reasons, for example - but it's always an important place to begin. What can we agree about regarding the statue? Do the dedicatory plaques tell the whole story of our community's involvement in the war? Is the statue a piece of art or is it purely a memorial?

The last question is an important one. What if we, through consensus, claim the statue as more "art" than memorial? It's an important distinction. Good art, after all, isn't static. Artists are often unwilling to share their own interpretations of their artwork because "good" art is timeless, allowing the observer to lay his/her own interpretation upon the art, rooted in her own context, time, and place. In that regard, the dedication of Fame and the racial undertones that may or may not have accompanied its placement are secondary. Important necessary, in fact - but secondary. Fame, as art, begs to be

reinterpreted for a modern context.

With that in mind, what if we unleashed the community's artists to help reinterpret the statue? Artists are often our best prophets, so what if we allowed them to wrestle with a broader, more holistic vision of Fame? How might they deal with the plaques at the base of the statue?

That's what happened with the slave cemetery next to the Old English Cemetery. There was a very clear reason why the stone wall was constructed nearly two centuries ago - to separate white from black. I completely understand the opinion of some that the wall should have been removed altogether.

Until someone had the brilliant idea of allowing artists to get in on the discussion - artists who, by the way, represented a variety of ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds. The result: pull down a portion of the wall. Allow the stones to look as though they were broken through and tossed aside. It's an incredible statement - theologically, culturally, and historically. The walls that separate us have been broken - not fully removed, but broken. The two cemeteries have become one.

How might we re-envision and reinterpret Fame? It's a beautiful piece of art, after all. Which is precisely my point: let's claim it as art. Art that isn't beholden to or enslaved to the artist's original intent, but is allowed to be reimagined throughout time.

There was a time when Fame represented our racist past (for some, at least). What might it represent in the future? How might it be a reflection of who we are? Who we ALL are?

"I pray," Jesus said, "that they may be one as we are one ... so that the world might believe." (John 17:21).

Let's dare to sit down and think in different ways. Let's dare to sit down and listen to one another, claiming this moment in time as an opportunity to tell a richer, fuller story of who we are. Let's dare to set an example for other communities? We can. I just hope that we will.

"We will be working at Isenberg Elementary School, which is also where we do our Gator Reading Program," she says. "This day is for all ages and all ability and mobility levels."

Pastor Laura is issuing a special call to all artists, as one of the projects will be painting inspirational quotes on the walls in the media center.

Another media center project involves scanning in library books for inventory. A second seated project is assembling gift bags for teachers.

Volunteers will also be sprucing up nature trails and perhaps creating some outdoor learning spaces, so bring rakes and shovels along if you're interested.

On Sept. 9, Marvin Moore, Isenberg's principal, will be in worship to remind members of the special day.

We will meet after church at Isenberg at 1 pm. We will wrap up our day of service by 3 pm.

Sometimes, says Karen Puckett, the schools are an easy target

for criticism. Puckett, a St. John's member, is media center coordinator for Isenberg.

"To know people are out there who are concerned that we succeed means a lot to us at Isenberg," she says. "It does take a village to raise a child, and I like the way St. John's goes out into the community to do outreach. St. John's is a model of going out into our community, which is wonderful. We love for people to come to school and see what it is all about."

Puckett is also gearing up for another year of the Gator Reading Program. Volunteers are asked to meet twice a week for 45 minutes around lunchtime to read with a child. Many volunteers share reading duties with one student, and come to the school once a week. The program will begin in October after in-house testing is complete.

"We'd love to have 10-15 volunteers for third-graders and 10-15 volunteers for second-graders," she notes.

Wednesdays Meals Are Back Sept. 12!

My husband and I were having dinner with my son, Andrew Poe, the other night, when out of nowhere he said, "Gosh! Wednesday meals are starting soon. I can't wait!"

A lot of St. John's folks are thinking the same thing.

Wednesday meals return Sept. 12. Often called "the best-kept secret in town" by Pastor Rhodes, the meals are \$4 for adults, \$3 for youth grades 6-12, and \$1 for elementary students and younger. Also, according to organizer Celia Jarrett, you can purchase a season pass of

23 meals for the 2018-19 year, and receive two free meals.

"That makes it so easy," she notes.

And easy is the name of the game for Wednesday meals, especially for families with young children.

"With two young kids, Davin and I love the ease of Wednesday nights at St. John's," Pastor Laura says. "We don't have to meal plan, prep, or clean up. Plus, we get to meet many different members that span across all three services. It is a great fellowship event!"

"It's just our Wednesday routine," says Lauren Stephenson, a volunteer for Kingdom Kids children's programming, which her sons Jeffrey and Emmett both attend. Husband Brad joins them for dinner. (Read more about Wednesday Children's Ministry programming on page 4.)

"I get really sad every time it's ending, because it's my favorite night of the week," Lauren says. "We get a hot, delicious home-cooked meal that's better than I can cook. We know the meal schedule so our whole family knows what to expect, and everybody likes everything. It's just kind of perfect for parents."



Lauren and others also praise Carol Hair, who leads activities with children after the meals conclude, giving parents the opportunity to linger and visit a little longer.

"There's people I don't see all summer long, and I miss those people," Celia says of the Wednesday evening fellowship. "It's an opportunity to be with people you don't get to see on Sundays or any other time."

She adds, "Ott Pinkston has developed an established menu, and people have certain meals that they really like."

Holly Zemke and her husband, Gary, attend the meals to spend time with son and daughter-in-law, Cory and Jennifer Gebhardt, and their daughters, Katherine and Sadie. The Zemkes moved to Salisbury a little over a year ago to be near their family.

"It's a way for us to see Cory and Jennifer," Holly says. "They're always going to be there because they have a season pass, and we're going to get one this year, too."

She adds, "It's a way to not only see their group of young people and their children, but it is a way for Gary and me to meet other people and see where we can plug in at St. John's. It's a great social time and the food is wonderful!"

Support St. John's Ministries through Thrivent

If you are a member of Thrivent Financial, you may have the opportunity to support ministries without any cost to you. If you aren't a member you can still support ministry with Thrivent Financial grant funding.

One option is a Thrivent Action Team project. Thrivent Action Team projects are charitable projects, which may include jumpstarting a fundraiser, service project, or educational event. Thrivent provides t-shirts, promotional material, banners, thank you cards, stickers, nametags, etc. along with \$250 community impact card for seed money. Any adult who is a Thrivent benefit member is eligible for two Thrivent Action Team projects per year. If you would like to use this as an opportunity to help serve our community but don't know where there is a need, check with church ministry leaders. There are lots of projects that can benefit from a Thrivent Action Team. For example, this spring, Pastor Laura used one to provide books to the CDC. You can apply online.

Another way you can support ministry is through Thrivent Choice Dollars. The amount of Thrivent Choice Dollars that can be directed depends on the amount of insurance premiums and or the amount of money an individual has invested in certain annuity products. Individuals can either call Thrivent Financial or go online to www.thrivent.com, login, and see how many Choice Dollars they have to direct. Choice Dollars accrue throughout the year and can be directed anytime. They can be directed to multiple organizations. A list of eligible participating organizations, including St. John's, can be found by doing a search on the website. You may have Choice Dollars that can be directed. Don't let them go to waste.

Funds received by St. John's from Thrivent Choice Dollars are set aside into two accounts, one called "Thrivent Choice Fund – Executive Committee, to be used for funding special ministry needs as determined by the executive committee. A grant for new websites for St. John's and St. John's CDC was approved in August.

The remaining half is set aside in an account called the "Thrivent Choice Fund - Ministry Team" and is used for ministry funding request initiated by the congregation (St. John's members, groups, committees, boards, teams, etc.). These funds may be provided as grants to cover cost or as challenge money to stimulate fund raising efforts. It is suggested these funds be awarded to encourage entrepreneurial ministries and support different needs and projects from year to year as there are many different ministry needs and interest within St. John's.

Application forms for Ministry Team grants are available from the church office.

Our Rich Heritage

Join us on Oct. 28 for (Another) 250th Anniversary of the Church!

On Oct. 28 at 6:30 pm, we will continue the commemoration of the 250th Reformation in Rowan by launching the heritage museum.

The John Lewis Beard deed of 1768 provided land for the location of a church— the first to be built in Salisbury— in the eastern square of the county seat.

The exhibit will interpret the background of the German settlement of the area that began about 1747, Salisbury's role as the "orderly" capital of the North Carolina backcountry, the cultural traits and habits of the nearby "Dutch Side," the political context of the North Carolina Regulation (a taxpayer revolt that prompted official British support for an "orderly" German church in Salisbury), and the service provided to the Salisbury Church (which later became known as St. John's) by it's first established Lutheran pastors during the American Revolution.

Dr. Gary Freeze will speak about the history and heritage of St. John's. The museum will feature artifacts and video.

Each Thursday morning for the last seven years, a group of 20-25 men gathers for food, fellowship, and the opportunity to dive deep into the scripture lesson for the upcoming Sunday worship service. Pastor Rhodes leads the study.

Since May 2017, the group has been meeting in the dining room at Trinity Oaks. It's a great central location, and super convenient for those in the group who just happen to live at Trinity Oaks. Residents who aren't members of St. John's are also welcome to participate.

Before digging into scripture, the men first dig into a hearty buffet breakfast. The staff opens a few minutes early to accommodate the group, and the men have this part of the dining room to themselves. Breakfast begins at 7:30 am, with the Bible study beginning around 7:45 — depending on how long the men want to talk about recent trips, health concerns, and other news and current events. And to be sure, there's always time for good-natured ribbing among the friends.

"We got started at The Palms," says longtime member Mike Jacobsen. "That room got tight — and hot!"

The men then tried several places around town before settling on Trinity Oaks after Bill Johnson, its executive director, offered the space.

"I learn a lot," Bill says. "There are lots of different perspectives."

So does Ted Goins, executive director of Lutheran Services Carolinas, who on this morning has to eat and run.

"It's just family," Ted says of the group. "I love having guys from church and our residents together."

Not only that, but it's a chance for men who attend different worship times to get to know one another better.

Pastor Rhodes, who leads the weekly study, has a reserved

spot in the middle of the U-shaped table. It's

set up for 25, and this morning is nearly full.

"Don't tell anyone," Pastor Rhodes quips, "but these guys are responsible for my sermons."

"It's the highlight of my week, no doubt," he continues. "The camaraderie, humor, and mutual upbuilding are things I look forward to every week."

Besides Mike, Bill, Ted, and the pastor, also on hand are Bill Safrit, Geof Hoy, Dennis Rogers, Norman Sloop, Larry Cesario, Randy Overcash, Mike Agee, Don Duggan, Jack Connery, Fred Krusemark, Bob Loeblein,

Gary Taylor is a regular but is recovering from recent outpatient shoulder surgery. Others in the group are traveling. Randy says he just drove a group of 150 Mormons to Illinois with Crossroads Tours.

"It was an eye-opening experience," he says. "I shared with the other driver about Lutheranism. We all need to understand other faiths."

Dennis and Norman sit near one another in Chancel Choir and at breakfast, and are longtime members of both groups. Norman shares news of a recent family reunion at Crossnore. More often than not, he also leads the closing prayer. Jack is new to the group and asks to be put on the weekly email reminder list.

Pastor Rhodes leads a discussion with the men about the upcoming scripture from Luke, the story of Jesus cleansing the 10 lepers. He encourages the men to spend time with God in gratitude, and not to forget to say thanks.

"See you in church," he says, as the group dismisses around 8:45 am. They linger in groups of two or three, chatting a bit longer before going their separate ways for the day.

Juliana Anderson's Summer as an Intern at Escuela Integrada

I am currently sitting at my gate at La Aurora Airport in Guatemala City, watching the sunrise, and feeling oh so incredibly blessed. I could not have asked for a better time here. I learned so much about this place, the culture, the people and myself. I felt so many things I either never felt before or have not felt in a really long time. I feel different coming home. I truly feel as though I am leaving Guatemala a different person.

I feel changed. I feel happier, lighter, more confident and inspired to continue doing work that uplifts others. My mom has always said to me, "It is not what you say or do that makes people remember you, it is how you make them feel that leaves the lasting impression." I greatly understand this because the way I am feeling right now is a feeling I know I cannot and will not forget.

...the feeling when they gave me a reassuring smile ...when they repeatedly passed me the soccer ball even though I failed to do anything successful with it every time ...how they asked to come with me after school to paint ...when they made one of their goofy faces just because they know it makes me laugh

...when they said a joke I heard a thousand times, but they know the joke is ours, so they say it again and again anyways

It is laughing together, embracing one another, encouraging each other, highlighting one's strengths and strengthening one's weaknesses. I felt these things: all of these pure, raw emotions that inevitably caused me to absolutely fall in love with this country, these people, my experiences and my new family here.

It is in these moments when I have this feeling, and the only way I know how to describe this feeling is that in each of these moments I am feeling His presence. I am realizing now as I am writing this that the reason I feel so changed is because this experience, these students and this place reintroduced God into my life, and for that I am eternally grateful.

I feel spiritually strengthened. I've been lost for the past few years with my faith, not whether or not I believed, but that I did not feel His presence. And now I do in everything I do. He is this feeling that I keep talking about. I feel Him when I walk into the school and a herd of students run to me and welcome me with hugs and besos. I feel Him when I walk through the streets of Antigua and am constantly surrounded by His creations. I feel Him as I mediate and reflect on my experiences and worries. I feel Him so fully and not only in the beauty, but in the suffering because I know He is present to teach me, help me get back on my feet, and guide me through the deepening of my faith. And I feel Him now as I sit here writing this is in Guatemala City, watching the sunrise, and feeling so incredibly blessed for this opportunity I will never forget.

I came to Guatemala to help and support the school, but every time I leave this place, I know that these students and these people helped me and saved me in ways I didn't even know I needed to be saved. It's funny. I didn't ask for any of this. I didn't even know I needed any of this, but the Lord

works in mysterious ways, and I truly believe that this journey—my journey—could not have happened in any other place, at any other time, and without the people that helped me experience this feeling.

I learned that pure, true love comes not from similarities or how well people get along, but from how you overcome one another's differences. It is about seeing a person for who they are, accepting them and embracing each perfection and flaw to the fullest, while pushing them to be the very best version of themselves, even when they cannot see it.

Escuela Integrada and Guatemala did for me what I could not do for myself. I made friendships in Christ, questioned and deepened my faith, and experienced a love for others and from others unlike I ever have before. I feel ready, as I head back to the United States, to begin this next chapter of my life through Christ.

Most of us, at some point in our childhood, have had an adult friend who listened to us and helped us get through the difficulties of growing up. It may have been a teacher, a pastor, a coach, or another adult to whom we could talk freely and who offered us support. They did not necessarily do anything other than listen and point us toward how to get through our difficulties, but their presence in our lives was very important.

For children who come from homes that are fighting illness, poverty, violence, drugs, or criminal activity, having that listening ear is so much more important. Sometimes just getting things off your chest, even if the person listening can't fix the problem, relieves a lot of the pressure under which these children live.

St. John's Lutheran Church has had a long-term program, the Barnabas Connection, that reaches out to children at Knox Middle School who are dealing with difficult circumstances. Once a week for a few hours, these volunteer friends are there for that child when they may have no one else to talk to.
