Youth Auction is March 31 This year's goal is \$18,000

"Flexibility is key to the game."

That's the note Youth Minister Kai Thurow has attached to his printer. It's a good thing.

Kai has definitely had to be flexible when planning this year's youth auction, set for Sunday, March 31, beginning at 4:30 pm.

He notes that another major community fundraiser was scheduled for the Auction's original date, leading him to choose a Sunday evening. "We didn't want to appear to be in competition with them, and there are no more Saturdays available until June, which is a little late to be fundraising for a summer mission trip."

Add to that the fact that Rowan-Salisbury Schools moved the start date of school to Aug. 7 — after the date for the Nashville mission trip had already been set. So Kai will be taking a slightly smaller group July 28-Aug. 2, with 27 high school youth and six adults.


The focus of the youth auction has also changed this year, Kai notes.

As the cost for mission trips and retreats continues to rise, some families are stretched to participate, especially if they have two or more youth involved. "We believe in the transformational power of these trips and retreats," Kai notes, "so we don't want finances to be a reason our youth can't attend."

With that in mind, the auction will raise funds for all off-site events, with a priority given to the summer mission trip.

Kai hopes to raise \$18,000 at the Auction, similar to that of years past. With fewer youth attending this summer's mission trip, there hopefully will be more funds to supplement other events.

Leadership. The winter is often loaded down with planning retreats, which was certainly the case this year. Our Leaders Retreat (mostly Council members) was Jan 25-26, including a 5-hour leadership training workshop on Saturday. Over 50 people participated in leadership training, which shows remarkable commitment to congregation and community.

Three priorities were identified at the Leaders Retreat: spiritual depth, families with young children, and marginalized communities. The priorities are intentionally broad, providing heightened focus to new and established ministries. As ministry groups meet to consider goals for the coming year, they'll be asked to give attention to the three priorities. In fact, the staff has already started. Meeting in retreat on Feb. 18, staff members began brainstorming and developing some super creative and exciting approaches to the three target areas.

It all begins with a committed core of leaders who center themselves in a common vision and invest in a common mission. No doubt, St. John's has some mighty fine leaders who do just that!

I'm fortunate to work with some Task Force, under the direction of Mark Ritchie. They've been outstanding leaders at St. John's. meeting since January 2018 to envision and build a culture of leadership at St. John's that is discipleship-driven and focused on three core areas: training (retreats, courses, online training), specific skill development (workshops, a resource guide), and mentoring. They hosted their first leadership training event at the Leaders Retreat to rave reviews. Much more to come, including a new initiative for early career adults.

> G2G Phase 2. In addition to the three priorities for 2019, Council members have taken seriously another major agenda item for 2019: phase 2 of our G2G project. The Steering Committee and its subcommittees are meeting, and plans are beginning to take shape. It's gearing up to be an exciting year as we give some much-needed attention to the renovation of the sanctuary building and the CDC. Interested in being a part of the effort? The Season of Lent

Worship | Pray | Give | Serve | Love

Sundays of Lent. Throughout the 40-day season of Lent, our pastors will unpack five parables of Jesus in a sermon series titled "Beyond Charity" (see page 3). Worship is at 8:30, 9:27, and 11:00

Wednesdays of Lent. Throughout the centuries, Lent has been a time for Christians to return to the disciplines of faith. Midweek Lenten worship helps us see worship as an integral part of our weekly rhythm. We begin with a meal at 5:30 pm in fellowship hall, followed by Evening Prayer at 6:30 pm, in the sanctuary. The 30-minute service is rooted in the beautiful music of Holden Evening Prayer, accompanied by piano, guitar, organ, and flute. Each week, a short message will focus on one of the five disciplines of faith: worship, prayer, giving, serving, and loving.

"To be honest, it's my favorite form of worship," says Pastor Rhodes. "Not only does it help me bid farewell to the day, but the service itself is cloaked in beauty and mystery, opening me up to a worshipping community that reaches far beyond our four walls. It's profound, really."



Lenten Sermon Series Invites Us to Reach "Beyond Charity"

If you're asking the question "What is the purpose of my charity?" then you're asking the wrong question.

Pastor Rhodes poses a different question: "How can I serve in a way that honors Jesus?"

And if you look deeply into the life of Jesus, "you'll discover that Jesus wasn't a very good example of how some folks think about charity."

"Jesus didn't give handouts to the poor," Pastor Rhodes says. "Don't get me wrong, there's no doubt he understood the importance of feeding the hungry and clothing the naked. Just look at Matthew 25. But his approach went far beyond that. Jesus walked alongside them."

A five-week Lenten sermon series, "Beyond Charity," seeks to answer some tough questions about how to live a life like Jesus, especially when it comes to the vulnerable. How do we love the poor? How did Jesus approach the leper? Where does the Gospel enter in?

Pastors Rhodes and Laura will dive deeply into five parables from Matthew that require a shift in thinking: to honor God and love our neighbors, we must live beyond charity.

"It's really looking very carefully at the life of Jesus and how he treated those on the outskirts of society," Pastor Rhodes says. "His was a ministry rooted in loving the neighbor, not just helping the neighbor."

To be sure, providing for immediate needs such as emergency shelter, food, and clothing is still critical, Pastor Rhodes says. "It's been a significant part of the church's history. After all, the first hospitals and food banks were established by Christians."

"But providing food, clothing, and shelter only touches the surface of how Jesus invites us to think about the needs of our neighbors. How do we build community? How do we shift from dependence to dignity? How do we think about mercy and justice from a biblical perspective? How do we genuinely welcome all people around the table? How do we serve in a way that honors Jesus?

A serious task, no doubt. But after all, Pastor Rhodes says, "It's Lent. Traditionally, Lent is when we look deeply into the life of Jesus. Where does that take us in our daily lives, and how will that help us grow more deeply in our relationships with God and one another?

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 6.





There are plans for a separate fund-raiser for the middleschool youth who will attend the annual WOW mission trip in Knoxville this July.

The Auction. Since the high school youth will be going to Nashville, the theme for this year's auction is "Nashville Nights." The evening will include a sampling of country music, as well as some new genres that are popping in this self-proclaimed music capital of the world.

Bidding for the silent auction begins at 4:30 pm. The meal will be served at 5, with the evening's menu reflecting the theme. The live auction begins after dinner. Tickets are \$15 for adults and \$5 for children 12 and under.

"Our goal is to be done by 8:30 pm since it's a school night and the beginning of a work week," Kai notes.

The Mission Trip. At last summer's National Youth Gathering (NYG) in Houston, Kai learned about Serve Boldly, a Lutheranbased organization that organizes domestic mission trips all over the country.

"They're all about teaching our Lutheran teens to accompany and serve alongside our neighbors," Kai says. "It's about understanding the needs of the community and participating in a sustainable way. We want to provide a deeper experience for our youth. Doing so through the Lutheran lens is a cherry on top."

Serve Boldly's first mission work was in Nashville in 2011, and now there are trips offered in cities such as Milwaukee, Chicago, Denver, St. Louis, Philadelphia, and Atlanta.

Kai is intrigued by the idea of going to Nashville. It's easier to get to than some of the other cities, he says. "When I think of Nashville, I don't really think of a huge need there, but there are always so many opportunities to walk alongside our brothers and sisters in Christ in many different ways."

The group from St. John's will be staying at a Lutheran church in downtown Nashville. During the mornings and afternoons, they'll participate in service and worship. Opportunities include working at food banks, refugee ministries, and children's centers. In the evenings, they'll be exploring the city.

"Work groups will change every day, so our youth will have the chance to interact with every single person on the trip."

49 Days of Gratitude Continues Until March 30

The 49 Days of Gratitude celebration is rolling on.

The event, which runs through March 30, kicked off Feb. 9 with a parade and opening ceremony in Spencer. A variety of events and activities are slated for March, including two events at St. John's.

St. John's hosted an art crawl, which took place Feb. 15 in Peeler Hall. The artwork will remain on display through the end of this month.

St. John's will also host The Phoenix Readers in a presentation on March 15 at 7:30 pm in the Faith Center.

The Phoenix Readers is a volunteer readers' theater company of local people ages 55 and up. Part of the St. Thomas Players at Center for Faith and the Arts, the group of a dozen readers is led by Dr. Jim Epperson, Catawba College professor emeritus of theatre arts. The group performs at libraries, senior centers, and other local venues. Phoenix Readers participating in "The Great War" include Mike Cline, Katie Davis, Ray Davies, Karl Hales, and Lori VanWallendael, with Epperson as director.

According to the CFA Web site, readers theatre has been often called "theatre of the mind," a medium in which performers conjure a rich, sensory experience for the audience. The acting style is a fusion of acting and reading, and the scripts are created from a variety of literature: plays, novels, short stories, letters, songs, and poems. The performance is primarily stationary, with readers seated on stools, chairs, or boxes and scripts held in their hands or placed on lecterns. Physical movement is mostly suggested; scenery and costumes are only selectively implied.

"The Great War" was first performed in 2018 at Rowan Public Library, when Gretchen Witt had a WWI display sent by the state of North Carolina. Last year marked the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I.

"Gretchen Witt asked us if we could do something on World War I," Epperson says. "It's kind of been mushrooming from there."

The group also performed recently for the St. John's Senior Seasons Academy.

Epperson put the script together based on writings from two library books, "Only Remembered," edited by Michael Morpurgo, and "50 Things You Should Know About the First World War," by Jim Eldridge.

Following the performance, the "Women of Faith" — Patsy Parnell, Diane Goodnight, and Diane Freeman, accompanied by pianist Kay Peeler, will sing several hits made popular during World War II.

The St. John's art display is a combination of several smaller groupings: military portraits by North Rowan High School students; mandalas by an artist, Elizabeth Cole, from CFA; collages by RCCC students and Trinity Oaks residents; and a collection of photos of World War II military equipment by a resident of Trinity Oaks.

The 49 Days of Gratitude has been inspired by the 70th anniversary of the Merci Train. Following World War II in 1949, the French people sent boxcars of gifts after the U.S.

sent an American Friendship Train filled with relief supplies two years earlier. The boxcar that came to Raleigh has long been part of the N.C. Transportation Museum, the group that's served as the project's home base.


St. John's members Sherry Mason Brown and Kimberly Lentz have been instrumental in developing the plans for the 49 Days of Gratitude.

The idea had its genesis two years ago, when Anna Everhart, now a sophomore at North Rowan High School, painted the Merci car as part of the Fresh Artists project. Anna served as junior marshal at last month's parade.

Four donation boxes are located at St. John's in Peeler Hall. The sponsors and charities for each box include: Darryl and Barbara Jo Corriher, Smart Start Rowan; Sherry Mason Brown, Barnabas Connection; Rhodes and Krista Woolly, Engage North Rowan; Kimberly Lentz, Henderson School. Wish lists are located with the boxes.

Additionally, St. John's is serving as a major sponsor for the Butterfly Project, another offshoot of the gratitude project. Students at Knox Middle School will paint the ceramic butterflies to be used in permanent art installations throughout the county. Middle schools throughout the county are participating. Each butterfly commemorates a child lost in the Holocaust, and the Butterfly Project promotes world peace.

Testimonies of Faith and Life

"If Kevin Can, I Can."

At Joy Lutheran, our little church in Tulsa, Okla., I enjoyed assisting at communion and reading the lessons at Sunday services. At other times, I ushered and counted about 60 members attending. That was a good number.

When we moved to Salisbury and St. John's, in 2012, I was lost in the size of this building, cathedral-sized by Oklahoma standards, the size of the congregation, the immensity of the choirs, bell choir and pipe organ, the number of its programs, and the size of its budget. I finally got up the nerve to put my name on the volunteer lists to read the lessons and assist at communion.

Today, seven years later, I read the lessons and usher occasionally. I recall the first time I read. We normally sit on the right side about halfway up, but when either Jill or I read, we move to the left side at the front so that it is not a long walk to the lectern. I was scared that first time reading to 300 people I did not know well, instead of 60 friends. It was a relatively easy lesson to read with no tough biblical names, so that was not a problem. But 300 people? With a magnificent choir behind me and 300 people in front of me? I had learned in Toastmasters many years ago to single out one person, make eye contact, and read to him or her. I had also been told to imagine that the 300 people were naked. But I could not do that in church. That would make it easy to read. But I was still scared.

On Friday and Saturday before my turn, I rehearsed the reading several times, finally reading it to the birds and squirrels from our deck early on Sunday morning. I was ready.

We got to our new seats, now among complete strangers, and somewhat afraid that someone would ask us to move from their seats. At the start of the service, there was a prelude, a music piece to be played on the cello. That would be soothing and relaxing. When that time came, this 11-year-old boy, sitting with his parents in front of me,

walked to the altar, picked up this cello, bigger that himself, and played the most beautiful music ever heard. He did it with such poise. When finished, he carefully laid the cello down and returned to his seat.

"If this 11-year-old can do it, I ought to be able," I said to myself. Trembling, I approached the lectern at the given time. On the floor was a wooden box for the shorter folks to stand on. I certainly did not need it, so had to clear it out of the way, making some unruly noise as I kicked it aside. That was my start. As I started to read, I picked out the gent I wanted to read to, made eye contact, and continued, thinking of that little boy and the big cello. I read the lesson fine, with no mistakes. If this little boy could do it, I could. To this day, seven years later,

Kevin Agner, now a senior in high school, still plays the cello exceptionally well. He has even been a soloist with the Salisbury Symphony. Once in a while, I still get to read the lessons, and occasionally, Kevin plays the cello at the same service. On those times, I walk to the front of the church thinking, "If Kevin can, I can." At other times, I think of Kevin as I approach the lectern.

There's got to be a lesson here. There are gregarious and outgoing people in this world who are not afraid to try anything. Then there's me and other people like me. I suppose there have been lots of "Kevins" in my life that have helped me out of my comfort zone, but I will never forget this one. Maybe one day I can be a Kevin to someone else. I hope so.

Thanks, Kevin.


"Spirits Rejoice!, by Jason Bivins explores the relationship between American religion and American music, and the places where religion and jazz have overlapped.

Much writing about jazz tends toward glorified discographies or impressionistic descriptions of the actual sounds. Rather than providing a history, or series of biographical entries, *Spirits Rejoice!* takes to heart a central characteristic of jazz itself and improvises, generating a collection of themes, pursuits, reoccurring foci, and interpretations. Bivins riffs on interviews, liner notes, journals, audience reception, and critical commentary, producing a work that argues for the centrality of religious experiences to any legitimate understanding of jazz, while also suggesting that jazz opens up new interpretations of American religious history.

Bivins examines themes such as musical creativity as related to specific religious traditions, jazz as a form of ritual and

healing, and jazz cosmologies and metaphysics. *Spirits Rejoice!* connects Religious Studies to Jazz Studies through thematic portraits, and a vast number of interviews to propose a new, improvisationally fluid archive for thinking about religion, race, and sound in the United States. Bivins's conclusions explore

how the sound of spirits rejoicing challenges not only prevailing understandings of race and music, but also the way we think about religion."

Camille Butner and Family Plan to Build Church in Honduras

When Camille Butner and her brother, Carl Nichols, were in the process of settling their parents' estate, they came up with a unique idea to donate the money.

Carl, who lives in Mooresville, has been involved in mission work in Honduras since 1992. Either this summer or next summer, he will join a team there to build a church in memory of his and Camille's parents, Jim and Daisy Nichols.

Jim and Daisy died a year and four months apart — Daisy in March 2016 and Jim in July 2017.

"We were having to clean out the stuff and it was very stressful," Camille says. "Carl and his wife Jane would help. One day, I decided, why don't we take the money from the estate and build a church? I told Carl my idea and he thought it was wonderful. It all became a big ol' pleasure, and we raised \$5,000 to build the church."

It took three sales in October and November to meet their goal, Camille says. "We finally raised all the money with the last one, and we were so excited. Cyndii Owen helped with the pricing, and we did it all ourselves."

Bless their hearts.

"Yeah, bless our hearts is right!" Camille says. "But we were so excited about the project, and it felt right. It felt like the God thing to do. We thought our parents would be happy. Getting rid of their stuff was a hard thing 'til I had a positive thing to give it to."

Carl, who spent his career with Duke Energy, does mission work through the Honduran Evangelistic Association. This group serves the Chorti Indians, an indigenous people in Honduras. The church they will build is much like a picnic shelter, with concrete floors and pillars, a metal roof, and rows of concrete blocks around the perimeter.

"Mom and Daddy had always been very supportive of my mission work," Carl notes. "Ultimately, when we build the church, I hope as many family members as possible can go with us. As soon as they get a village that qualifies, we'll go down and build the church."

To qualify for a church, a village must be holding ongoing worship services and have a worship leader who agrees to take training.

Although the church is being built in the Nichols' memory, the village will give the church its name, Carl says. "I thought it would be a positive thing. It accomplishes two things: we were able to prepare the house to sell it, and we were able to donate to a worthy cause. It gave everybody a chance to do something good, not only for an oppressed people, but for the Lord."

Carl and his wife Jane are members of First Baptist Church in Mooresville. He says of the project: "It gives a sense of permanence to the village. They know it's the Lord's building."
