Pastor's Letter



Dear friends,

In the first two months of this year, of St. John's. In addition, I've lost two aunts since January, and we've grieved alongside many of you in the deaths of your loved ones.

n two months.

Deaths and funerals are emotionally draining, no doubt. At the same time, they provide room for rich story-telling and family-gathering. It's been years since I've seen my cousin Dee Dee, but we sat next to each other at Pleasant Grove Baptist Church three Saturdays ago as we bid farewell to our Aunt Audrey. It was good to see her.

Funerals have a unique way of gathering us together and putting things in perspective.

One of the things that I love about St. John's is the sheer number of people involved in funerals. Once we learn of a loved one's death, a large team of people immediately and unwaveringly begin their assigned tasks: pastoral care, meals, bulletin prep, ushers, flowers, the pall, reception, music, calling members of the funeral choir, preparing the service, arrangements for the columbarium, coordination with the funeral home, and making sure the sanctuary is ready. So many folks involved in a single task: to help escort our loved one from this life into the next.

It's profound, really.

It also places things in perspective. Here's what I mean. In January, we began our G2G Campaign, a monumental

five-week effort to raise \$3.8 million for necessary renovations to our sanctuary building and CDC. We've been planning for over a year, and I guess I assumed all along that we have led seven funerals as pastors the world would stand still why we conducted the campaign.

Well, that didn't happen. And that's a good thing.

Sure, I'm enormously thankful for the congregation's response to the campaign. I'm humbled that we're able to do what many congregations only dream about.

But when I was preparing the eulogy for Janie Allen's funeral — just 12 days into the campaign — it struck me that what we do best as a community of faith has nothing to do with fundraising or renovating. What we do best is to tell the stories of faith and sing the songs of Zion. We hold the hands of those who grieve and prepare meals for those who are weary. We cry with one another and dance with each other. And occasionally we bid farewell to each other, confidently whispering to God, "Into your hands we now commend your servant."

I'm truly excited about our G2G campaign. It's a critically important part of our journey together and will be an exciting chapter in our congregation's history book.

But even that pales in comparison to those precious times when we hold the hands of loved ones and escort them from this life into the next — crying, remembering, loving, and singing. Always singing.

Let's learn how to forgive. Together.








Looking Back: The Sanctuary's 1975 Renovation

From generation to generation, St. John's has been steadfast in the stewardship of our facilities. After all, much wear and tear can occur after thirty years of use.

Such was the case in the early 1970s when our congregation found itself facing significant maintenance, preservation and enhancement needs from a sanctuary that had not received a facelift since 1947. The sanctuary needed new carpet, the stained glass windows needed repairing, and the interior needed painting. It was also time to invest in larger space for our music department as programming and participation had grown exponentially since the renovations in the 1940s. Participants were simply out of room.



1975 Sanctuary Renovations

The task force, formed in 1973, included current church members Julius Waggoner, Dr. Bob Tannehill, Glenn Ketner, Jr., and Mark Ritchie, who represented the youth of the church. A major discussion point centered around the placement of the altar. Should it remain at the back of the chancel or placed in the center, as had been done in the chapel? Ultimately, the decision was to keep the altar in its present (and current) location.

Approved by the congregation in February 1975, the renovation was broken down into three phases according to priority: Phase One consisted of extensive roof repairs, repairing the lead surrounding the stained glass windows, repairing acoustical panels, restoration of the altar's tryptic, interior painting, refinishing the pews (a decision later changed to purchasing new pews), relocation and elevation of the pulpit, moving the organ console, and upgrading the sound and lighting systems.

Phase Two focused on the music suite by expanding the rehearsal rooms, adding two choir robing rooms, and a music library.

Phase Three focused on some relatively minor work to the fellowship hall and the archives room.

Luther Sowers was commissioned to redesign the pulpit. Though not initially included in the project, he also designed new brass-covered doors for the Innes Street entrances to the narthex.

Phases One and Two were completed within seven months and dedicated on Sunday, Dec. 14, 1975. Phase Three began in 1976. The total project cost \$150,000. \$115,000 was committed during the initial pledge campaign, after which, on Easter Sunday 1975, Clifford Peeler challenged the congregation to step forward in faith and raise the needed funds. Within two weeks, an additional \$35,000 was raised to complete the project.



The Gathering: How Wednesday Night Meals Began

Last month, we told you some of the stories of the St. John's "cooks in the kitchen."

This month, we asked Georgi Goss to share her memories of how the Wednesday meals came to be, since she was instrumental in starting the Wednesday night gatherings. Georgi is the daughter of the late Martha Agner, who wrote a two-volume book about the history of St. John's.

Here's what Georgi had to say:

In early 1989, congregation member Meetta Lampert and Pastor John Derrick approached me about helping to establish a Wednesday evening dinner which could be followed by learning or art experiences. That way, adults who didn't have children in the Weekday Church School program would have something to attract them to the church on Wednesday evening besides just food. That sounded like a great idea to me. Families who were picking up children from Weekday Church School could stay for dinner and then leave if they chose to. John suggested that choir practice and handbell practice could be moved so that they would immediately follow the meal.

I agreed to help Meetta with this project, which we named The Gathering. I would, as a volunteer, plan the menus, shop, and cook, as long as other volunteers helped cook and clean up. Meetta, with ideas from John and me in addition to her own wonderful ideas, would organize the classes and guest speakers.

The kitchen was in sad shape and we were told there wasn't any money in the budget for commercial equipment.

Something needed to be done, so I met with the building committee to discuss options. In preparation for the new demands on the old church basement kitchen, my husband donated two new oversized residential double ovens to the church, so that we would have four ovens available to cook in, and Bob Glover and his band of carpenters built cabinets to house them. It was an inexpensive remodel. At some point, someone came through with enough money for us to be able

to add a commercial pass-through dishwasher with the requisite stainless steel counter attached. The remodel was completed quickly, before I began cooking at the beginning of September 1989.

Although I had grown up in a large family and could readily prepare food for large crowds, I wanted to be certain I wouldn't let anyone down, especially Meetta, who was working to organize the after-dinner activities. So in preparation, I also visited and observed Mary Frances Roueche while she prepared lunch for the Rotary Club, which she had done for quite some time. She generously shared some large-volume recipes and so did a patient of my husband's, who had been a cook in the military.

I planned the meals on Monday, shopped on Tuesday, and cooked on Wednesday. I checked on Thursday that the money taken in covered what we had spent on food. Volunteers from different Sunday School classes came on Wednesday to assist with the cooking, serving, and clean up. I met, and renewed acquaintances with, a great many members of our church. Helen Lentz, in particular, repeatedly volunteered, and Rita Bolick became my "right hand man," helping every week. Rita and I became close friends; we each had two children, and I was pregnant with my third one for the last 3½ months that I cooked at St. John's, although I told no one until the last dinner had been served at the end of May. Olivia was born in November 1990.

As far as I know, St. John's has been able to offer the Wednesday evening meals every academic year since Meetta and I started the Gathering.

What a great legacy! Thank you, Georgi, Meetta, and all who have been a part of our Wednesday gatherings. As we prepare space for a new generation of ministry, we give thanks for those who have helped us get where we are today.

"A remarkable response!"

After five weeks of our G2G Phase 2 Campaign, you have pledged or contributed \$3.2 million, based on a total project goal of \$3.8 million. What a remarkable response!

Your investment shows that you believe in the ultimate goal of our campaign: to prepare space for a new generation of ministry. As you know, that includes replacing all of the sanctuary building HVAC units, renovating the fellowship hall and kitchen, renovating the CDC, adding handicap accessible restrooms to the lower and sanctuary levels, renovating the music suite, and replacing the sanctuary's sound system and carpet.

The project represents the first major renovation since 1947, although significant work on the sanctuary's aesthetic was completed in 1975.

The St. John's sanctuary is an icon for the city of Salisbury, firmly standing in the center of downtown for nearly 100 years. No doubt, those before us were faithful stewards of the building and the many different ministries it has housed over the years. We have been richly blessed because of their faithfulness.

Now it's our turn. Thank you for stepping up to the plate!

Some significant historical moments loom on our horizon, which provides heightened interest in this project. In 2022, we will celebrate the 275th anniversary of the congregation. St. John's is Salisbury's first church, which means that we've grown up together. To a certain extent, our anniversary is the city's anniversary, and we'll certainly want to celebrate together.

2027 marks the 100th anniversary of the sanctuary building. Because of the congregation's terrific growth, the church was relocated from North Main Street to its current location, paving the way for expanded ministries and presence in the community. By the mid 1950s, it was the largest Lutheran church between DC and Atlanta, and boasted the largest Sunday School attendance in the entire United Lutheran Church.

12 generations of our forebears brought us to where we are

today. This campaign builds on that legacy as we prepare space for a new generation of ministry.

What's next? A few things come to mind:

The Campaign isn't over! Perhaps you would like to contribute or increase your level of participation. There's plenty of time for you to respond as we seek to complete our fundraising goal of \$3.8 million.

Interested in a naming gift? Naming rights are provided based on certain giving levels. See the campaign brochure for more information. We're actively seeking naming gifts for the music suite, the CDC kitchen, and the new CDC multi-purpose room.

This is a no-debt project. One of the most important steps our Council took early on is in claiming that phase 2 will be a no-debt project, which means that work will commence when we have cash/pledges in hand. The decision guarantees that the congregation will not be burdened by future debt repayment or exorbitant interest costs.

Drawings, Bids, Renovation. Because of the congregation's tremendous response, Council was confident enough to secure the work of a local architect, Bill Burgin, to begin work on architectural drawings, a process that takes approximately 8 weeks. Once drawings are complete, the project will be put out to bid (approximately 4 weeks). Once bids are reviewed, Council will recommend a specific bid to the congregation, outline the renovation timeline, and put forward a plan for how ministries will continue during the renovation process.

Thanks abound. A project like this takes the collective effort of lots of people. Special kudos to our G2G Steering Committee chair, Mark Lewis, the G2G Building Team chair, Mike Agee, and other members of the leadership team (Franco Goodman, Raymond Coltraine, Amy Ritchie, and Bill Safrit). A debt of gratitude is also extended to our faithful staff. Because we chose not to use an outside consultant, our staff has taken on the responsibility of guiding the inner workings of this campaign. Many thanks to them.

And thanks to all who have been a part of this journey. What a special time in the life of this congregation and community. If you've not yet invested in this campaign, I'd be happy to talk with you about it. Just let me know.

St. John's Lutheran Concord 275th Anniversary

This year marks the 275th Anniversary of St. John's Concord's inception.

A shared name and history. The congregations share a name and a common history, including the same first Lutheran pastor, the first Lutheran Pastor in North Carolina.

In 1772, Christopher Layrle from St. John's in Mecklenberg County and Christopher Rintlemann from Organ Church in Rowan County were commissioned to go to Germany to seek a minister and schoolteacher. The Rev. Adolph Nussman was officially called and commissioned as pastor and Mr. Johann Gottfried Arends as schoolteacher by the consistery.

In 1773, Nussman was the first ordained Lutheran pastor permanently in North

Carolina, serving in Rowan County, primarily at Organ and St. John's [Salisbury]. Nussman remained for one year, before moving to Mecklenberg County where he served the remainder of his life.

Arends remained in Rowan County, where he continued to serve St. John's [Salisbury] and was ordained in 1775.
