I was one of those kids who actually liked going to church.

Mostly because I had no choice; but also because each Sunday I sat in the balcony with some of my very best friends. Since they went to different schools, that was the only chance we had to hang out. At church.

I'm not sure what I

would've done if this pandemic had hit when I was a teenager in the early 1980s. I'm sure I would've been lost, lonely, and out of rhythm. And if *church* had been taken away, well – and I'm being serious -- it would've been rough.*

Some of you have felt the same way these last 8 months. I know, I know, there's something enjoyable about grabbing a cup of coffee and watching worship in your pajamas on the front porch.

But if you're used to worshipping at our 11 am service, you miss feeling the organ at full blast, smelling the aged wood and extinguished candles, seeing the amber glow of stained glass windows.

And sitting in the balcony with some of your very best friends.

The first time I walked into the St. John's sanctuary, I was overwhelmed by the sanctity of it all, as if the Holy Spirit herself was welcoming me home. Last Sunday when Mary

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God."

Hebrews 12:1 and 2

One of the most beloved hymns of our faith that embraces the Festival of ALL SAINTS DAY, is the hymn "For All the Saints", which has been sung for over 150 years in Christian churches throughout the world and is often sung for Services of Resurrection and Memorial Services.

All Saints Day, is on Nov. 1 this year. Many people are not as familiar with 'All Saints Day' as much as the day before which is known as *All Hallows'* Eve (Halloween), but it is still a holy day for many Christian congregations and far more important in the life of the church. It is also an opportunity for us to give thanks for all those who have gone before us in faith, those famous or obscure, including our loved ones who have passed and who are now part of the "communion of saints' who have gone to glory.

One of the great mysteries of our faith is that every time we gather around the Lord's Table we join the saints above and the saints below in *mystic sweet* communion.

And so, with your people on earth and all the company of heaven we will praise your name and join their unending hymn: Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory.

The hymn 'For All the Saints' (original title, For All THY Saints), was written in 1864 by the Rev. Doctor William Walsham How (1823-1897). How was the Anglican Bishop of Wakefield of the Diocese of Wakefield, England. His hymn was written as a commentary on the article in the Apostles' Creed, "I believe in the Communion of Saints."

Bishop How served various congregations and became a *Suffragan* Bishop (an assisting bishop who does not automatically succeed a diocesan bishop) in east London in 1879. In 1888, he became the Bishop of Wakefield where he

was called the 'poor man's bishop' and "the children's bishop". He had a passion for working with the marginalized and the destitute who lived in the slums of London and the factory workers in west Yorkshire. His desire to reach his flock led him to write several theological works refuting the current controversy of the day, the Oxford Movement which sought a more 'Roman Catholic' approach to ritual and belief within the Church of England. He also attempted to reconcile biblical creation with the theory of evolution. He would write over thirty hymn texts including for many hymns, including several for children in a collection called *Poems and Hymns* published in 1886.

In his hymn For All the Saints, William How portrays the relationship between 'the Church Militant (the faithful on earth), and the Church Triumphant (the saints in heaven) which is greatly emphasized throughout this hymn. In the very first verse of For All the Saints, Bishop How points our eyes heavenward to the Church Triumphant which states the purpose of the hymn, that we sing praises to God for all the saints who have finished their course here on earth and have entered eternal life. "Whoever acknowledges me before men, I will also acknowledge him before my Father in heaven" (Matthew 10:32).

For all the saints, who from their labors rest, Who Thee by faith before the world confessed, Thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blessed. Alleluia!

The second verse reminds us that salvation and the living of a holy and courageous life is only possible by the grace of God. Only if God be our rock, our defender and our strength can we stand a chance in the battle of this earthly life. "For I do not want you to be ignorant of the fact, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud and that they all passed through the sea. ² They were all baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea. ³ They all ate the same spiritual food ⁴ and drank the same spiritual drink; for they drank from the

spiritual rock that accompanied them, and that rock was Christ". (1 Corinthians 10:1-4)

Thou wast their Rock, their Fortress and their Might; Thou, Lord, their Captain in the well fought fight; Thou, in the darkness drear, their one true Light. Alleluia!

The third verse of the hymn becomes the connecting verse where we who are here on earth – the Church Militant, share blessed communion with the heavenly saints because of our unity in Christ, and though we might feebly struggle while we're here on earth, the vision of God's glorious kingdom that they already share in - and our communion with them greatly encourages us as we are still builders of God's kingdom *on earth*. (Hebrews 12: 1-2)

O blest communion, fellowship divine! We feebly struggle, they in glory shine; Yet all are one in Thee, for all are Thine. Alleluia!

While Bishop How wrote at least eleven verses for this hymn many hymnals today only include seven or eight of them, far too many to write about in this article. In every version however, the final verse brings us full circle from heaven to earth and back to heaven again where we get a glimpse of the magnificent procession that will continue for those who will come after us after we've made our own journey! This final verse is a reflection on John 12:32 where Jesus says: "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself."

From earth's wide bounds, from ocean's farthest coast,
Through gates of pearl streams in the countless host,
And singing to Father, Son and Holy Ghost:
Alleluia!

In this hymn William How gives us a powerful vision and awesome celebration of life in Christ. It also reminds us today that in this life though struggles, pandemic and when we falter we receive hope and encouragement from

remembering the lives of these saints. In God's grace and promise and In their example, we will be included in the "countless host, singing to Father, Son and Holy Ghost!" ALLELUIA!

The original tune for this hymn was called *SARUM*, composed by Joseph Barnaby (1838-1896) organist and choir master of St. Andrew's, Wells Street, London. The tune that we use today is called *SINE NOMINE* (Latin for 'without name'), composed in 1906 by the renown Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872 -1958). Vaughan Williams was a prolific English composer and editor of sacred, folk, and symphonic music. Perhaps one of his best loved anthems is his setting of *The Old Hundredth Psalm* Tune (Psalm 100), *All People That on Earth Do Dwell*, which premiered at the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in 1953 and has been sung by thousands of choirs the world over ever since.

"We've spent almost nine months living in very uncertain times," says Deacon Rob Durocher, minister of music. "For worship, it's about being thankful for all the resources that have kept us moving forward."

That means incorporating as many different people and readers and online greeters as possible, along with instrumentalists and vocalists from inside and outside of St. John's.

"We are celebrating our spiritual resources through the gifts of music," Rob says. "We don't have a 45voice choir, and we don't have handbells and other ensembles, but we sure are thankful for what we have."


This time has also given our staff the opportunity to be even more creative in worship. "Drop-in" videos and online countdowns are now the norm.

"We've never been turned down by a community member to help us out with prayers or readings," says Pastor Rhodes. "On at least three occasions we've had participants from around the world. It's truly become a community service."

Kevin Agner has enjoyed being a part of it all, especially the times that he and Rob have collaborated to write/perform some music together.

"The things he writes for me are really impressive," says Kevin, a sophomore cellist at UNC who grew up at St. John's. "He's ventured into some things I thought were really cool. He's definitely gotten good with putting the cello into pieces where it wasn't before."

Kevin has been back home since late August.

"I'm taking classes online, trying to stay focused, and still seeing some friends in town," he says. "Rob checks in to see when I'm available and I've been glad to come play."

"It's definitely a different experience, especially from a performance standpoint. There's no live audience, and that is a big part of it for me. It's just a different environment than having a full church of people."

Still, he's gotten good feedback from his participation.

"Obviously, my family is always watching," Kevin says. "I know people are definitely enjoying the music, and how the service is adjusting to fit the new times. It's the situation we're in, so we make the best of what we've got. For me, it's fun to play in the congregation I grew up in."

The same is true of Carter Woolly.

Carter moved back home during mid-March from Washington, D.C. He's now working for Congressman Mark Walker, who's based in Greensboro. Carter has been serving as a worship leader since he's been back in Salisbury.

"I had conversations with my dad (Pastor Rhodes) and Rob, and we were talking about what worship would be like moving forward," he says. "It started out with Rosemary and me with two mics. I really like what they've done recently with adding more choir members."

Since Carter was in the Men's Chorus at St. John's, and the *A Cappella* Choir at Lenoir-Rhyne University, he's happy to participate in worship as a vocalist.

"I'm one of the few people who have had the privilege to worship at St. John's most Sundays through the summer. I feel for so many people who aren't able to go. But this service has been a bit of a lifeline for folks."

Carter has appreciated the Sundays when small groups of members have been able to come in, such as Graduation Sunday, First Communion Sunday, and Confirmation Sunday.

"That's given us a bit of a congregational presence," he says. "It has been cool to see folks' reactions when they've come back."

Heroes Work Here!

Heroes work here! Yes, they most certainly do! St. John's congregation and our surrounding community are fortunate that St. John's CDC never closed their doors even during these extremely challenging times.

In March, the decision was made to continue operating. Staff was reduced to lead teachers and administrators only. The state mandated for a period of time that only children of essential workers could attend. A staff of 35 dropped to 15. There were no assistants or floaters.

How did our center make this new normal work? The core teachers were dedicated, flexible and there was no teacher turnover. They worked wherever they were needed. Instead of teaching 4-year-olds, they may have been in the infant room. Each of them did what was asked of them. It was stressful, but they have made it through by adjusting and remaining adaptable.

What do our numbers look like now? Later, all the children were allowed to return. Currently our CDC is back up to 28





staff members and 125 students. Prior to COVID, there were 35 staff members and 180 students.

The staff is required to wear a mask or a shield. United Way, the state and others donated masks. Pastor Rhodes is working towards supplying all the CDC employees with a mask that bears the St. John's logo.

What happens if a staff member or a child becomes sick with COVID 19? If this happens, and it has, our administrative team works with Rowan County's Health Department, following their instructions while being transparent with the parents.

How were we able to remain afloat financially? The state has been very beneficial making sure child development centers could continue to operate. They provided shipments of masks, bleach, paper towels, no touch thermometers, hand sanitizer... NC continued to pay DSS payments based on the number of DSS children attending our center in February. DSS parent fees were paid as well for 5 months, April – August. Parents are now responsible again. As of Sept. 1, DSS payments are returning back to normal. Teachers, who were continuing to work, were provided state bonuses twice. Operational money was also awarded to our center. The church closed one side of the building to decrease expenses.

Thank you heroes for all you have done for the children, their families, our church and our surrounding community. We are so grateful! Keep up the good work!

Outdoor Learning Environment

What about our Outdoor Learning Environment? We're sure if you have driven along West Innes Street you have noticed the excitement that is occurring almost daily as our Outdoor Learning Environment becomes a reality.

Notes from our designer, Colleen McDaniel:

A pergola and an arbor are completed.

The cedar shingle roof will come soon following inspection of the framing.

Irrigation main lines are being installed. The concrete sidewalks will follow.

There is ongoing construction of the other structures. Soon work will begin on the individual play areas and plantings will happen.

The perimeter fence is being fabricated but there is a long lead time at the manufacturer. A temporary fence will be installed and remain in place until the perimeter fence is completed.

Is the staff ready for our new and exciting Outdoor Learning Environment? The answer is yes. Seven of our CDC employees have earned their Early Childhood Learning Environments Certificate from NCSU Natural Learning Initiative. This 24 hour educational hours class is targeted towards early childhood professionals and others interested in improving early childhood outdoor play and learning environments. Learners gain skills and knowledge required to plan, manage, promote,

At-Home Learning At Escuela Integrada in Guatemala

Since the start of the pandemic, Escuela Integrada has moved to a strict distance learning model. Distance learning has been difficult, but not impossible. Some of the difficulties impoverished families encounter when it comes to distance learning include 1) No computers in the home; 2) Limited or no access to internet; 3) Limited cell phone service; 4) Small homes in disrepair, sometimes housing 10 or more family members under the same roof 5) No desk or workspace in the home; 6) Limited lighting or no electricity; 7) Limited to no education of the parents or guardians; 8) Parents who are illiterate; and 9) Inadequate materials to complete schoolwork.

The evolution and advancement of technology in the developing world is not on par with the pacing of the United States, however, smartphones are relatively affordable in Guatemala. Economical smartphones can be purchased for as little as \$40 new; in many cases, families buy them used. Since these phones are not under a contract, they operate with a pay-as-you-go method. Individuals are able to purchase data packages and cell phone minutes for as little as \$0.75.

Escuela Integrada saw it as critical to continue providing education to the children during this time. In order to pivot to a distance learning model, the At-Home Learning campaign was created in April of 2020. This campaign provides data packages for both the families and teachers, increasing the efficiency of communications between students and teachers. Every week, the teachers of Escuela Integrada send study guides to the students digitally. Students complete the assignments and stay in constant communications with their teachers throughout the week. Teachers can answer questions and review work via their smartphones. Teachers also record video or audio classes and send them to students. Occasionally, they will have Zoom meetings for essential classes, though the data and bandwidth required for live streaming makes this a less frequent practice. Escuela Integrada has successfully completed three full quarters of



school through the at-home learning model. As the new school year starts in January, the school most likely will continue with a hybrid version of online learning and physical classes.

In a country like Guatemala, where there are minimal resources for education, the idea of at home or distance learning seems far-fetched. The need for this program in an effort to achieve equity in learning cannot be overstated. These children would simply not be able to receive education during this time if not for the At- Home Learning campaign. These families have already committed to stopping the cycle of poverty when they put their children in school. Our long-term goal has always been for the students that walk through our doors to have a financial stable future, then continuing this ripple effect on to future generations. We don't want this effort to be impeded in this season of at-home learning, simply because they do not have access to technology.
