'A rare treasure'

Rosemary Kinard to retire after 19 years at St. John's

The scene perfectly encapsulates what kind of relationship Rob Durocher and Rosemary Kinard have had. On communion Sundays, after the anthem is finished, the Doxology follows. If you watch closely, occasionally you'll see Rosemary begin to play, while Rob finishes.

How do they *do* that?

"We trust each other," says Rob. "It just worked."

Rob and Rosemary, associate parish musician, have built a relationship based on trust and respect through Rosemary's 19 years in the position.

On Sept. 19, Rosemary will retire from the position in which she has served so joyfully.

"I have been thinking about this for several months," Rosemary admits. "But then Rob had to have wrist surgery and Pastor Laura resigned, so I knew I could wait. I did not want to detract from her."

But now it is time to step away.

Rosemary moved to Salisbury in 1986. She and her two sons visited many different churches.

"We came to St. John's, and I was just blown away by the liturgy and the music," she says. "I had never lived near so many Lutheran churches. I grew up a Baptist in the Deep South!"

Rosemary and her sons joined St. John's in 1987. The boys were active in the youth program and the music program, she says. "They were very, very happy at St. John's."

Rosemary began work at Catawba College in 1987. Before her retirement there in 2008, she taught a variety of music courses. With Karl's encouragement, she began the highly successful Service of Lessons and Carols, which continues today.

At St. John's, Rosemary founded the Men's Chorus, the Chapel Choir, the Chapel Music Team, and the Flute Choir. Prior to the pandemic, she and Karl were co-directors of the Trinity Oaks Singers and Ringers.

The Men's Chorus came out of a church talent show which featured a barbershop quartet.

"Then that group began to grow," Rosemary says. "Karl said, 'I'd like to sing in a group because I never get to sing. Why don't you direct?'"

"It was just the right time for the right idea," Rosemary says.

At its height, the Men's Chorus boasted more than 50 members, and gave a concert each spring and at Christmas. She says she especially loved working with Janie Rollins, who accompanied the group over the years.

She and Karl also collaborated with the late Dan Brown on the hymn, "Together We Go Forth," commissioned for the congregation's 250th anniversary in 1997.

Join Our 3rd Grade Reading Program at Isenberg!

“This may be the most critical time ever in helping our kids learn to read”

During the 2015-16 school year, St. John’s began a partnership with Isenberg Elementary School to help third graders improve their reading skills.

The third-grade year represents the first year of testing, says Karen Puckett, the school’s media specialist and a St. John’s member who has shepherded the program ever since.

“In grades 1 and 2,” Karen explains, “you learn to read. After third grade, you read to learn.”

“Vocabulary is the great equalizer,” she adds. “If students improve their vocabulary, they improve their reading skills. If they improve their reading, they have a far greater chance to succeed in life.”

Which is why 3rd grade is such a critically important year.

Thanks in large part to the Gator Reading Program, Isenberg has met or exceeded growth in the years the program has been in existence. Prior to 2015, 3rd grade reading scores were below their expected level of growth, per state guidelines.

This year, the program is set to kick off in mid-October, once this year’s third-graders have been evaluated. The program typically serves 15 to 25 students who meet with a tutor twice each week for 45 minutes. For each student, we need 1-2 volunteers, depending on whether a volunteer wants to commit to once or twice each week.

During a 45 minute tutoring session, the first 20 minutes is for targeted work with comprehension or vocabulary. The last 20 minutes is a fun time for students to read books with their “reading buddy.” Together they read books that are of interest to the students and reading-level appropriate.

Volunteers can work any day(s) of the week from 1-1:45pm.

“It’s a huge honor for students to be in the reading club,” Karen notes. It’s something they look forward to every week.

Volunteers are trained by the Rowan Literacy Council, and all support material is ready when volunteers arrive at school.

“It’s just been a very successful program,” Karen says.

She points to comparative data from the 2017-18 school year that compared Isenberg to four other schools with similar school demographics. At Isenberg, 66 percent of the Gator Reading Club students were at or above reading level. At one school, 43 percent of the students were at grade level. At a second school, 25 percent of the students were at grade level. And at the last two schools, none of the students were at grade level.

“Intervention works. And we need it now more than ever.”

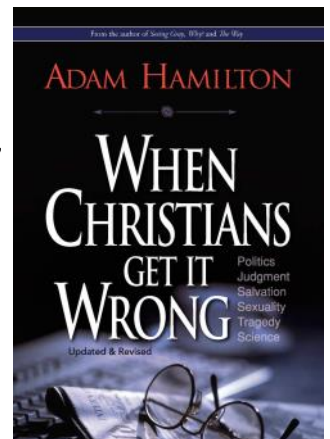
When Christians Get It Wrong by Adam Hamilton

2021 Confirmation Sunday

On Sunday, August 15, fifteen youth made public profession of their faith and laid claim to their baptismal promises. In baptism, we are welcomed into the covenant God first established with Abraham, the age-old reminder that God has taken the first step in our relationship with Him. In Confirmation — also known as Affirmation of Baptism — we say “yes” to that covenant relationship and agree to bear the image of Christ to all the world. At St. John’s and throughout most of the ELCA, Confirmation Sunday is the culmination of a two-year process of faith formation, which includes classwork, servant projects, retreats, and a week-long confirmation camp. Throughout the summer, our students have been preparing the faith statements that you will hear today — publicly stating “Why Jesus is central in my life.” What a blessing to welcome these young men and women into the life of faith!

God gave me such an amazing father and it is hard to imagine how amazing God is.”

A devastating 7.2 magnitude earthquake struck southwest Haiti on Saturday morning. Over 1,400 people were killed, and that number is expected to increase as search-and-rescue efforts continue. Blocked roads are delaying the delivery of vital supplies to hospitals, which are overwhelmed with more than 6,900 injured people. At least 26,000 homes were damaged or destroyed, but the full extent of damage is still unknown. 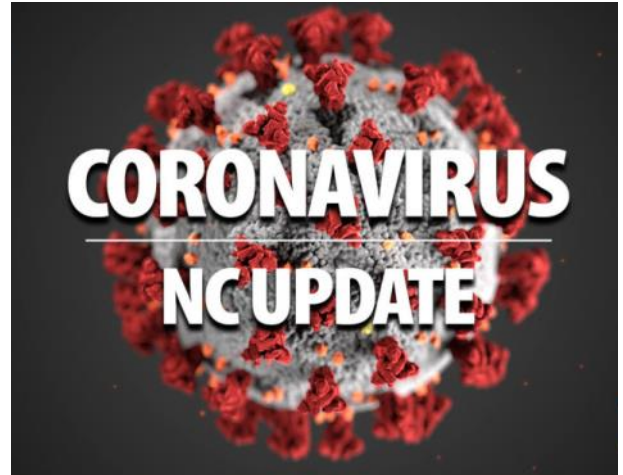

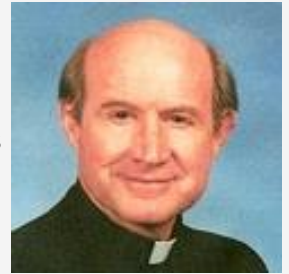
